Interview With New Lake Superintendent - Jack Steele

About four Sundays ago we were able to catch Jack Steele for a couple of hours to get his plans and ideas about the improvement of the lake. We can begin by stating rather positively that you can expect more improvements at Buckeye Lake in the immediate future and that we can count on his cooperation in the elimination of hazards to boating, fishing and swimming. The headquarters for the park police have been moved from Picnic Point to Liebs Island, where they will be open 7 days a week from 8:00 to 5:00 beginning April 1 for the procurement of boat and dock licenses, and there is docking space in front of the new office on the north bay side or it can be reached by County road #58, which goes out to Liebs. You will notice in this area the new \$90,000. suction dredge, which is operated by state employees and is currently working on a fill of approximately 100 acres between Liebs Island and the mainland. Jack estimates about two to three years of pumpting to complete this task, at the end of which time it will be a state park. The fees remain the same as last year: Slips with cover - \$12.00 for one, \$6.00 each additional; open slips - for each dock on private property - \$3.00; on state easement - \$6.00. Barbara Durctcher at Millersport 467-4191 will give you additional information if desired. Patrolman Roger Young and Don Eberts will return again this year to patrol the lake.

The steel barrel buoys will be replaced by new fiber plastic buoys that have no lights, but would not damage a boat on collision. Jack plans to have one ski zone in the center of the lake in place of the previous two and it will be from approximately the yacht club in a westerly direction to approximately Sellers Point. The middle of the ski zone will be lined with plastic buoys and one-way traffic will be maintained to the west of the northerly side of the buoys and to the east on the southerly side. Our perpetual rock hazard between Cranberry Marsh and P/C Haggard's peninsula will be thoroughly marked as a danger during this season and Jack promises to rid us of this hazard during the winter of '65-'66. This will indeed be a long needed and much appreciated improvement.

Jack emphasizes that Buckeye Lake is not a flood control lake and that he has to operate the level according to his directions. At no time is he permitted to open more than one gate of the spillway, and that only one-half open. There is a 10 ft. drop between the spillway and Newark and when the Licking River is already flooded, there is danger to the City of Newark. His instructions are to lower the lake 30 inches below the top of the spill way level beginning November 1 and to start filling up this 30 inch drop beginning March 1. After the flood sea-son is over, on approximately April 1, 17 inch metal boards are added on top of the spillway, extending it 17 inches higher. This brings the lake to its normal spring flush. With the new splash boards he has prepared, he is hopeful that the August low level will not be quite as shallow as it has been in the past due to the leaking around the wooden splash boards.

Jack and his wife, Geraldine, and son, John, age six, who goes to Millersport School, are honorary members of the Club and we sincerely hope they will avail themselves of Club privileges so we can get to know them better. would appear certain that Buckeye Lake is in for more improvements under the new administration and the State can count on the cooperation of Buckeye Lake Yacht Club in these improvements.
