## Notes From The Commodore

This is a good way to leave a perpetual gift to the Club — that means so much to so many of us. Gift may be anonymous if desired.

The Board also amended the by-laws at the March meeting to include a provision whereby widows of members may maintain their former privileges enjoyed during their husband's life. Each will enjoy her past privileges for one fiscal year after her husband's demise, and thereafter may continue such by paying an annual fee to be fixed by each Board of Governors. The fee has been fixed at \$18.00 per year by the present Board. This recommendation to the Board was made by P/C Haggard and his Committee, who again called upon P/C Fisher for his legal talents to comprise the proper change in by-laws. Club privileges will, of course, terminate upon remarriage, unless the new spouse is a member of BLYC.

Remember, the Aux Mardi-Gras Party on April 23 and the Club spring WORK DAY on the next day, Sunday, April 24. The Raven skippers will have their annual meeting to plan the season on Sunday, March 20, at the Club.


