LIGHTNING SNOWBALL

Our big home regatta - 26th Annual Lightning Snowball - was well attended this year with 43 Lightning sailors.

The first race was started Saturday morning in heavy air with gusts of wind up to 30 mph. The fleet lost 6 of its competitors during this race due to capsizing. Unfortunately, one of those capsizes was Marty Headlee, and another was Paul Henderson. Jim Dressel took 1st this race followed by Bruce Goldsmith 2nd. Jon Ruhlman placed 3rd, Ron Blair 4th, and Al Berg 5th. Greg Fisher was 7th.

The second race was started at 2 pm with much the same type of air, and maybe even a little more of it. Again the capsizing took six more boats of which two broken spars were included. Jim Dressel turned over and also had one of the broken spars. To make matters worse, he was out in first place when this happened. Greg Fisher also capsized. Ballard Kirk was sailing with a borrowed boom since his was broken in the first race, and Bob Preston had to sit out this race since he didn't find a replacement for his torn jib. One good and thankful note we can add is that we had no personal injuries during the weekend due to all the capsizing. Special thanks went to all club members who helped the troubled boats, and also to the Coast Guard. They didn't get a chance to rest all day. Bruce Goldsmith won this second race, followed by Marcy Lippencott (skippering club member Terry Ottenweller's boat), Berg 3rd, Ed Ballenger 4th and Matt Fisher 6th.

Needless to say, not one word of complaint was heard from our visitors or club members about the cocktail party, dinner, or dance.







GUN CLUB NEWS - The BIYC Gun Club is all ready for your pleasure. The trap has been cleaned and tested and challenges you to beat it. We have ambitious plans for the upcoming season. Vis.-V.P.
