


#### FROM THE BRIDGE \$ \$ \$

Sunday, September 16, 1979 marks the end of another BLYC year. It has been a busy year. The annual meeting will have many reports of many accomplishments. Actually your board, with the outstanding help of several members, has accomplished more than we set out to accomplish.

The planned major projects, i.e. the kitchendining room addition and the replacement of the boat houses with larger covered docks, has been done at a cost which will be about 7% above the original estimates. The reinforcement of the Venture dock with steel piling and new stringers, was a long term <u>future</u> project which had to be moved into the <u>present</u> to preserve the docks. That cost was not budgeted, so we may have to borrow some money next fall or winter. As a result of the tremendous amount of work done by Gov. Virgil Bateman, Comm. Wilbur Wuelner, and Comm. Whitey Limes, along with donations of time and materials by other club members, the real value of the club facilities has increased considerably more than the money expended.



Saturday, August 18, one hundred twenty-five folks turned out for the delightful party with marvelous prime rib dinner and dancing on the patio to greet 12 of our 21 new members.

Congratulations to our Junior Thistle team, Dan Dressel skippered, with Mike Hein and Philip Schell, who took fourth place out of 15 boats at the ILYA Junior Regatta at Put-in Bay. Sixty some BLYC supporters turned up at the Bay during Junior Bay Week.

The I.L.Y.A. Jr. Race Week (quarterfinals for the Sears Cup) at Put-In-Bay, July 29 - Aug. 2, was a very exciting week of racing. The Put-In-Bay Yacht Club did an excelent job hosting the regatta, with Mr. John Borman as General Chairman. Fifteen teams attended, representing their respective yacht clubs, all looking forward to trying to beat Mark Thompson from Pymatuning Yacht Club, last years Sears Cup winner.

Registration began at 2:00PM on Sunday, with the registration ladies trying to get parents to sign up for firewatch at the Park Hotel. I would like to thank my mom and dad, and also Joan and Mike Hein for taking midnight firewatch on Sunday and Monday. All boats were in the water by evening, and there was an Icebreaker dinner at 6:30. All the teams and their parents got to know each other, and then the race committee chairman, Mr. Cal Canfield, went over the schedule and race instructions. After all had been said, the dinner ended, and all participants were in the Park Hotel by 10:00, ready for the week of racing.

The winds were a moderate 10-20 m.p.h. for the first race. We got a fair start and rounded fifth at the weather mark. We held this position and finished fifth. Mark Thompson won. We felt that a fifth was a good finish for our first race and now that we were getting used to sailing on Lake Erie, we gained some confidence. As the wind was increasing and we outweighed everyone by at least forty-five pounds (crew weight), we had great psyche for the next race.

We waited an hour for the next start while boats were being repaired, but we finally started in a steady 15 m.p.h. breeze. We got a good start, and promptly drove over Thompson. Our boat speed was good in this condition and we led at the first mark. Up the second beat it was extremely tight racing, but we tacked below John Sackett of Leatherlips on the starboard tack lay-line and rounded just ahead of him. The downwind leg was the last leg of the course and these are the most nervous legs I have ever sailed. It is hard to hold a lead on these legs, especially with five boats close together as they were. We gybed a few times and managed to hold a very slim margin to the finish line. The finishimg gun was followed by a wild honking of horns by the many boats from B.L.Y.C. that were there. We were very excited about winning the race, and we talked of how close a series it would probably be as we sailed in for lunch.

The next three races were very close as we had predicted, and after five races, five boats had qualified to sail in the round-robin series for the championship. Thompson qualified first and Fred Hunger from Cleveland qualified second. We won the last qualifying race to put us third, while Sackett qualified fourth. Rounding out the top five was Doug Kerr from Erie.

Racing in the championship series was incredibly close. At the end of four races, three boats had a chance to win, but we weren't one of them. We had not sailed consistently enough to win. The best we could have done was third, but that was only a remote possibility. The four race scores were as follows: Sackett-8: Thompson  $9\frac{1}{2}$ pts.; Hunger- $10\frac{1}{2}$ pts.; B.L.Y.C.-14pts.; Kerr-18pts. The last race would decide the outcome.

We decided that since we had no chance to win, we would try to stay away from the three contending boats and try to win the race. This we did the first leg, but we went to the wrong side and the three were ahead of us at the first mark. We gained much distance on the two reaching legs and were a close fourth at leeward mark

mark. Once again we went away from the three boats, played the shifts, and found ourselves in the lead at the weather mark. Hunger rounded second, followed by Thompson and Sackett. If these positions would have held, Sackett would have won. But Thompson split, went far to one side, got some good wind, and almost caught us at the finish line. We nosed him out to win, while Hunger crossed third and Sackett fourth. This was enough for Thompson to win. The final standings were: Thompson, P.Y.C. - 11½pts.; Sackett, L.Y.C. - 12pts.; Hunger, C.Y.C. - 13½pts. B.L.Y.C. - 14 3/4pts.; Kerr, E.Y.C. - 23pts..

Although we did not win the regatta, we were happy to find out that we had won the Shipshape Trophy, for the best caretakers of boat and room. We had worked hard during the week to clean up, and we were pleased to recieve this award.

On behalf of our junior crew, consisting of Mike Hein II, Philip Schell, and myself, I would like to thank Buckeye Lake Yacht Club for all their support. A special thanks to Willy Petersilge, who helped us prepare for the regatta, and also coached us during the week with some helpfull hints. Thanks again, Willy. Finally, I would like to thank all the members of B.L.Y.C. who came up to watch the races. It is good to know that there is so much interest in the junior program, and I am looking forward to sailing next year.



FRANK FOSTER Governor in charge of Entertainment

Since July 20th there has been a fair amount of on-lake racing but the off-lake racing has slowed a bit. However, the Ventures had what Jeff Wagner calls a very, very INTERESTING trip in Canadian waters.

First the Venture Fleet completed their second Sunday Series. Out of the seven scheduled races only six were sailed. Because of the Canadian trip and various Lake Erie excursions plus late-comers to the fleet only two boats sailed the required five races to qualify for the series. Phil Ragno won the series with  $8\frac{1}{4}$  points while Dave Miller took second with 12 3/4 points. The third Sunday Series was to start August 19th but the wind didn't cooperate.

The Highlander Fleet has really got things going again. Not too much has happened on the Wednesday night series but the Sunday Series is roaring along. The Highlanders have decided to have just one Sunday Series which will end with races on September 23rd. They are going to allow four throwouts during the Series. The results after nine races (throwing out four) show Dick Loesch in first place with 5 points followed by Lowell Christman (10), Walter Grubb (11), Art Heitman (15) and Jim Hafer (16). They are sailing two races each Sunday so the Series is still wide open.

The Lightnings and Lasers have sailed some races but not really enough to establish a trend.

Off-lake racing, as I said before, slowed a bit after July 20th. One of the most important races was the Sears quarter-final sailoff of the Juniors at Put-In-Bay. I will pass this by as there is excellent coverage elsewhere in the Log by Dan Dressel, the skipper.

The North American Lightning Championships for Juniors was sailed this past week (before August 20) at the Cleveland Yacht Club. There were in the neighborhood of 20 boats participating and there were six races scheduled. Of the six scheduled only three were sailed and the third was in dead air. Willy Petersilge with Dan Roshon crewing were going along great until the dead air hit in the last race. As a result Willy wound up in 8th. Dan Dressel also participated.



It was a family trip as a number of the families' children went along. The cruise sailed from Tobemory and made it to such ports as Little Current, Kilarney and

Okeechobee. The trip covered 155 nautical miles (not including going over and under waves). It seems that there were a few obstacles to overcome on the trip that made some sailors cringe just a bit. To mention a few - lotsa rain, cool to cold weather, 6 to 8 foot waves, fog and fog and fog including a five hour motoring trip in dense fog and arriving at the proper destination. At one point the group went through five gallons of stew beside one of many bonfires. At Rattlesnake Harbor there was an award ceremony.
