Ed Ballenger Commodore DID YOU KNOW THAT ? ? ?

There has been a lot of talk about "Tornadoes" lately in both the News and TV media.

What is a Tornado? The dictionary defines a Tornado as: "A violent whirling wind, especially in the central United States, accompanied by a rapidly rotating funnel cloud that usually destroys everything along its narrow path."

Ohio has had its share of Tornadoes in recent years. One does not have to be reminded of the terrible destruction and loss of life in Xenia, Ohio. More recently, only last year to be exact, the damage at Cardington, Ohio, not to mention the four casualties.

backeye Lake has had its share of these "Twisters" as they are sometimes called. In May 1909, on the 15th to be exact, a Tornado struck the area at the west end of the lake known as "Lakeside". It has been as recent as three years ago that the last remaining building of the "Lakeside" community was burned down by the Millersport Fire Department.

In June of 1922 two Tornadoes hit the "Park"area, one on the 11th of the month and another on the 19th. To say the least it took a little time to get the "Park" back on its feet.

Watkins Island, the home of Buckeye Lake Yacht Club, in the meantime had been spared of any damage in all of these storms. However the Clubs luck was to change.

On Monday 18 June 1928, after a morning and afternoon of steady rain a large black cloud appeared to the North, at the same time a large white cloud appeared in the South West. For some reason the two masses moved closer to each other until they collided with a crash that sounded like the crack of doom.

Their collision seemed to set them spinning and wound themselves into a single swirling funnel like mass with a whipping limber spout.

This whirling funnel came up the tow-path, tore up trees, blew the feathers off of birds, debris of every description was every where. It even lifted cottages off their foundation.

The Club grounds were a mess. The structures on the island suffered along with everthing else. The roof coverings, sheathing and rafters were gone from the north end of the boat house and also most of the south side of the Club house. There was nothing left of the front porch above the floor line except rails, posts and beams to the east of the front steps. A roofless two story cottage was blown into the lake just west of the Club.

All of the above mentioned havoc happened in about three minutes.

The latest storm hit the east edge of the lake on Sept. 13 1978.

As far as ${\bf I}$ know, there were no fatalities in any of the Tornadoes that have hit Buckeye Lake.

1400 hours.


Fleet Captain and Cruise Coordinator Greg Alspach and C.C. Emeritus Jeff Wagner literally extended sealed envelopes with course directions to the cocktail party scheduled from 1500 hours to 1700 hours to eleven boats. The directions required skippers to follow charted compass headings for designated lengths of time at approximated hull speeds until they reached a point off the party site. George Zukovs, by skill or luck, won the award for being closest to the hailing point in the correct time from his start.

Marianne hadn't reckoned with the wind with its 20 MPH gusts making tying up to a seawall cross-wind tricky at best. But, with dozens of hands ashore to catch lines--most attached to the boats--and to fend off from cement and fiberglass, all cruisers gathered at the luxurious party home of Gary Franke. Lancaster's "premiere party giver" Pearleene Reffitt had laid out a feast from meatballs, crabmeat dip, and fresh fruit and cheese to the fleet-funded cold keg and iced cans of pop. Linda Wachtel joined us for the party, as we remembered the first fleet captain and the first Buckeye Lake mini-cruise he directed in 1971. Bob would have loved this one!










Rafting for overnight in Maple Bay



The Sears Cup Quarter Finals will be held at Put-In-Bay July 26th through July 29th.



Buoyage Changes

ANNOUNCED BY COAST GUARD

Key points of change to the buoyage system are reported by Ron Ward, who attended a Coast Guard briefing on behalf of USYRU members.—Ed.

Several changes to the maritime buoyage system have been announced by the U.S. Coast Guard as a result of a cooperative agreement signed by the U.S. with the International Association of Lighthouse Authorities (IALA) in November, 1980.

The revisions will conform to the new IALA Maritime Buoyage System—a single international set of rules, with only one difference between two delineated regions of the world (red to port in all countries *except* in North, South and Central America, Korea, Japan and the Philippines).

Implementation of the changes is slated to begin in 1983. The entire program is scheduled to be completed over a six-year period, with buoys to be repainted or replaced during routine overhaul periods which are scheduled on a six-year cycle.

To summarize:

- All port-hand buoys will become green.
- Junction/bifurcation buoys will have red and green horizontal bands, following existing preferred channel rules.
- Mid-channel buoys will have red and white vertical stripes. *Unlighted* mid-channel markers will become spherical—these will be the *only* U.S. buoys to change shape.
- All port and starboard aids will have green or red lights, respectively. Lighted midchannel markers will retain white lights. The candlepower of the red and green lights will be increased to extend visibility

to the same theoretical range as the present white lights.

- Junction/bifurcation buoys will have a composite group flashing (2+1) light rhythm. These will be the only U.S. light rhythms to change.
- New distinctive "topmarks" will be added to buoys that are not can- or nun-shaped, to aid in their identification. These will be cylindrical, conical or spherical. Spherical red topmarks will be required on *lighted* mid-channel buoys. The Coast Guard will eventually add cylindrical or conical topmarks to port and starboard aids, where practicable.
- Cardinal marks, which indicate safe water to the named side of a mark, will not be used in the U.S. A few will be introduced in Canada, creating the possibility of confusion in limited areas of the Great Lakes or St. Lawrence. Great Lakes sailors should also note that implementation of the new buoyage system will begin earlier in Canada than in the U.S.

The impact on U.S. yachtsmen should be slight if they are informed in advance. The experienced mariner should be familiar with equating green and port-hand aids, since daymarks and lights on that side have been green for several years. The Coast Guard expects to publish a brochure this summer for wide distribution, and intends to coordinate changes with chart makers. Watch your local Notices to Mariners and Coast Guard headquarters for the latest information, and help them and your fellow yachtsmen by spreading the word.

PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGE

The Board of Governors has approved, for publication in the Log, a change in the By-Laws. The change is to Article III Addendum, Section 1, subsection (h) which appears on page 17 of the reprinted By-Laws.


This Section currently provides:

"(h) No alcoholic beverages, other than 3.2% beer will be sold or consumed on the permit premises on Sundays, Primary or General Election Days;"

The proposal is to delete the word "Primary or General Election Days".

The Board is informed that Ohio law has been changed to permit the sale of alcoholic beverages on Primary or General Election Days. This proposal would bring our By-Laws into conformity. The By-Laws as recently printed omitted the proposed deletion in the expectation that it was likely that the Board would adopt this proposed amendment. Therefore, the newly printed By-Laws read as they will if this amendment is adopted.
