IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL B.L.Y.C. MEMBERS

Status Update of East Port

The board of governors with the concurrence of the Trustees have proposed a summary statement on the status of the East Port property. The purpose of this report is to convey to Buckeye Lake Yacht Club (BLYC) membership the intentions of the Board of Governors (B of G) with respect to:

- 1. Further the objective of BLYC as stated in the constitution.
- Addressing the implied understanding of the May 1983 BLYC meeting in which some members report that there would be no action on East Port (EP) for the time being.
- Current situation at EP.
- Alternatives available for the maintenance required in order for EP to continue to "pay for itself".
- Goals identified for EP in a 5-10 year plan.
- 6. Mechanism to go forward with 5-10 year plan.
- 7. Request for membership support and bids for implementation. . ..
- Article II of the constitution. The objectives of the club shall be the promotion of yachting and aquatic sports, cultivation of sociability among its members and improvement of Buckeye Lake (BL) for boating purposes.

These are the stated objectives of BLYC:

- ° Promote yachting
- ° Promote aquatic sports
- ° Cultivate sociability among members
- ° Improve Buckeye Lake

Your B of G are committed to these objectives for not only EP but the

complete BLYC and facility.

- A few members have reported their interpretation of the EP purchase included an implied agreement to have no action on improving the EP facility. Others report no such recollection or agreement. The B of G will do what is required to further the constitutional objectives of the club.
- The current situation at EP is that the building has a leaking roof. The lease has run out on the current lessee. In order to get a reasonable lessee to develop a commercially successful business the Presently BLYC may have to carry some of roof will have to be fixed. the costs of paying off the EP facility.
- One alternative open to BLYC is to provide the maintenance required for EP which will allow the facility to continue to "pay for itself". This includes the cost of a new roof, approximately \$4000. The new roof is required before a lessee can develop a successful business at EP. This approach will allow a lessee to sign a relatively short term lease giving BLYC the option to develop the property at some future time. Another alternative is to encourage the lessee to include all maintenance costs in the lease agreement, which would alleviate BLYC of the financial burden but probably would require a longer lease in order for the lessee to make a profit on the investment.

A third alternative is to negotiate a longer term lease on a portion of the EP property in exchange for the development of a first class facility. The opportunities are available to dream or fantasize about a first class commercial restaurant with a view of Buckeye Lake. This could become the new center of development and improving the town of Buckeye Lake. This satisfies one of the objectives of the BLYC constitution.

5. The success of any program is directly related to the thoroughness of the plans and controls built into the plan. However, no one can see the future, but we can all dream. Your B of G has come forward with a list of facilities that <u>COULD</u> be part of BLYC if the membership wants to have it. Remember, the founding fathers of BLYC did not have the benefit of what this generation takes for granted but their foresight set a direction and a goal. We are still working to fulfill their objectives.

The 5 to 10 year goal or dream of the B of G is to have a broad range of facilities to satisfy the needs, interests and objectives of BLYC as stated in the constitution.

- A. Promote yachting
- B. Promote aquatic sports
- C. Cultivate sociability among members
- D. Improve Buckeye Lake
- A. Two factors which will promote yachting is for BLYC to have an area to store boats on trailers and sufficient docks to satisfy the needs of the member. Giving boaters an opportunity to store their boats on their trailers in a parking area will broaden the base of those interested in sailing at BLYC. This will probably result in a return to larger more competitive fleets at BLYC. The option to use such a boat storage arrangement will open up currently used docks which can be used by larger boats, thereby, also increasing participation for both power and sail boats as guest slips in the basin and as permanent docks in other areas.
- B. The addition of a swimming pool also furthers the objectives of the constitution to promote aquatics. Participation for some members are currently limited to only those in the family who are interested in sailing, water skiing, or other available options. The addition of a swimming pool broadens the aquatic sports significantly and will provide a wider basis for family participation at BLYC.
- C. Cultivating sociability among club members is approached on two fronts. The addition, as space allows, of sport related facilities is aimed at increasing use of BLYC as a family club. Such additions as tennis courts, health spa facilities including exercise and sauna are possible. The extension of all the facilities to year round can be accomplished by covering the exterior facilities, i.e., pool and tennis courts with a translucent fabric dome such as is over shopping centers and football arenas.

The other phase of extending sociability of members would be focused on the improved larger facilities available as part of the restaurant facility which could include meeting rooms and banquet halls. The current facility cannot comfortably handle all members and guests if all the members wanted to use the meeting facility at one time. For

example, sometimes the number of participants are limited to the monthly entertainment programs at the club. An enlarged facility would increase this number if that is the memberships' desire.

Now that the grand and glorious plan has been proposed in a bare bones form, and if it is the desire of the majority of the membership, how do we go forward so that at the end of the 5 to 10 year plan BLYC will have accomplished that goal? The first step is to identify those parties willing to work with BLYC

to develop a mutually agreeable facility. The following is a first draft of such a proposal.

° The facility must extend the objectives of the BLYC constitution.

- Promote yachting

- Promote aquatic sports

- Cultivate sociability amoung members

– Improve Buckeye Lake

° Concurrent development paths must be feasible and agreeable for the commercial facility and the BLYC water sport facilities.

° The investor must turn over the facility to BLYC at the end of the lease. The length of the lease will be proportionate to the value of the facility.

° The lease is negotiable before the termination date.

° An implementation plan will be in place 6 months after the agreement is signed.

° The lessee will provide for security of property and personal well

° There will be a minimum investment and financial burden required for

BLYC membership. 7. Since this program requires a long term commitment on the part of the BLYC the B of G requests input from the membership. Please provide a list of items that you think are necessary to satisfy the objectives of the constitution.

- Promote yachting

- Promote aquatic sports

- Cultivate sociability among members

- Improve Buckeye Lake



Michael F. Higgins


