John had an outstanding lunch and the keg was cold. We have more improvements in the works- more in the next log.



Fashion's Legacy at Ohio State

Students interested in fashion merchandising will get a boost from a new scholarship fund created in memory of a former fashion model,

Two Ohio State alumni, William and Lynn Lust, endowed the fund with a gift of \$20,000. It is a memorial to Lynn Lust's late aunt, Catherine Woodward, a lady who, according to her many admirers, was a highly successful model, buyer, and seller of women's clothing. Income from investment of the gift will provide scholarships for juniors or seniors in the College of Administrative Science who major in marketing and have an interest in fashion merchandising,

Throughout her life, Catherine Woodward demonstrated her interest in fashion and in education. Universally known as "Katie," she had a long career in fashion retailing prior to her death in 1983. She began as an errand girl fresh from high school and during her 40-year career advanced to the position of a respected buyer of women's apparel. She worked for the Fashion department store and the F. & R. Lazarus Company in downtown Columbus and was a popular model in the Lazarus Chintz Room. Even during her later years, she was often called upon to give fashion shows.

Lynn Lust, now a third grade teacher, remembers Katie's encouragement of her education. Lust obtained the master of arts in education degree from Ohio State in 1973.

"Katie valued education," Lust said.
"She took self-improvement courses and taught fashion classes at Columbus Business University."


Katie was well known in Columbus for her generosity, particularly toward women and students. Among the many community organizations for which she raised funds were the Columbus Female Benevolent Society and the Virginia Wright Mothers' Club, both associations dedicated to helping disadvantaged women. She also aided students through the Ladies Auxiliary of the Columbus Dental Association. Her husband was a dentist.

Students of fashion will have more than a scholarship by which to remember Katie. A gift-in-kind of "period" clothing will allow them to see and feel the stuff of fashion itself. Katie had a clothing collection that included garments from the turn of the century to the present. Her "flapper" dress and other finery are now in the collection of the Department of Textiles and Clothing in the College of Home Economics.

This newly established historic costume archive aims to provide a treasury of insights and directions for future inspiration. The collection is growing apace under the direction of Charles Kleibacker, a New York couture designer, and Lucy Sibley, a textiles and clothing historian.

Many well-known couturiers' works are represented, from Chanel to Bil Blass, as well as outstanding examples by more obscure designers. The vintage garb includes 19th century attire and gowns once worn by Marilyn Monroe, Joan Crawford, and Gloria Swanson. A support group, the Friends of the Historic Costume and Textiles Collection, is currently being formed to help develop and maintain this storehouse of distinctively personal traces of our heritage.

JUNIOR TRAINING

How many of you have ever been to a BLYC Board of Governors meeting? THE WAY WE WERE

THE TOWPATH NORTH OF THE CLUB. WAS IT A TOW PATH?

Often we refer to the "towpath" as the site of the cottages and homes of many prominent and dedicated members of the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club. But, why was it there? The principal canal approached Buckeye Lake, then known as the Licking Reservoir or Licking Summit Reservoir Improvement, from the north at Sellers Point and went in a southwesterly arch through the lake to Millersport. Its towpath is on modern charts of the lake and has caught many a sailing keel and powerboat prop. From there the canal passed, I believe, southwesterly to Carroll and Lancaster. So why this North Bank towpath?

Well, first of all it was really part of built dam the water. The dam ends at the little lake by the old park. However, the farmers of Thorn Township and around Thornville needed a "seaport" to transport their produce to market so they could get higher prices for Thornport, the towpath passing north of the club and a channel through the lake were all created for that purpose. The story is referred to in should be 1883 edition of The History of Fairfield and Perry County. The Licking Summit Reservoir had been constructed as a feeder to the Ohio Canal, by means of high artificial embankments. This construction turned the three or four little natural lakes into one large body of water, and also submerged much of the adjacent flat country.

The "Licking Summit Reservoir Improvement" was the name of an enterprise that was expected to bring Thorn township into direct connection with the canal, and furnish a good home market for all surplus farm products. In pursuance of this idea, a boatway was cut through the Reservoir from the feeder, some three miles northeast of Millersport, on the Ohio and Erie Canal, to a point at the southeastern extremity of the Reservoir, about one mile from Thornville. A two-horse tread-wheel boat was to tow canal boats to and fro along this boat-

way, a distance of several miles. Thornport was laid out, a large hotel and warehouse were speedily constructed, and quite a little town sprung up as if by magic. Things went on swimmingly for a season, and the strange craft plied regularly between Thornport and the Feeder, on the Ohio and Erie Canal, carrying out the surplus grain products of the township and returning with salt, groceries, hardware, dry goods, and other commodities. But just as the only "seaport" of Perry promised to be a substantial success, if not a "beauty and a joy forever," the wicked floods of adversity poured in and quenched all the rising hopes of promise. One day as a canalboat was being towed in slowly through the delightful, placid waters, and all earth and sky apparently as lovely and serene as the blue waters of the lake itself, a storm suddenly loomed up in the northwestern sky, and almost in a twinkling rain descended in torrents, forked lightnings flashed, and the thunder rolled and jarred until even the big catfish at the bottom of the lake were stunned. Worse than all for the hardy seafarers, the winds blew a fearful hurricane, the waves of the agitated lake tossed and rolled around as fearful as the waters of the Atlantic in mid ocean. There could be but one result. The frail fleet was not prepared to weather such a gale, and the whole concern was wrecked, the boatmen thankful that they had escaped a watery grave. It is probable that the boatmen who encountered this "storm at sea" carried exaggerated reports of it to the men of the Ohio and Erie Canal, and

it is certain that no captain or men would venture out into the Reservoir again; and thus ingloriously ended the inland navigation of Thorn township, and the costly boat channel, scooped out with so much toil and difficulty, became a desert waste of waters. Thornport went quickly down as a consequence. The "banquet halls" of the big hotel became deserted, and rats, weasels and minks played prisoners' base in the commodious warehouse where had been safely stored thousands of bushels of golden grain.

More information is given in <u>The Story Of Buckeye Lake</u> by Joseph Simpson, published in 1912 (p. 17).

LICKING SUMMIT RESERVOIR.

The construction of the Lake began with the building of the Ohio Canal. When finished it was known as the Licking Summit Reservoir. It was intended as a feeder for the canal both north and south from this point. It was completed between the years 1825 and 1837.

The Reservoir's construction consisted in building a long earth dam reaching westward, two miles from Buckeye Park, then turning southward two miles to the entrance of what is known as the Deep Cut. This southern portion of the dam was made stronger, and is now known as the Old Tow Path.

And at page 33 Simpson says:

Channel to Thornport.

Before turning the water within the banks a well defined channel from the west end of the reservoir to Thornport had been hewn through the forest to secure navigation. From in front of Neddy Stone's tavern (recently burned and which occupied the present site of the new hotel at Buckeye Park) canal boats could be seen slowly moving along, being propelled by pushing with long poles, keel boat fashion. Going west they would be loaded with flour and grain for Cleveland. Returning, they brought pine lumber, salt, saltfish, and other commodities. A pilot was really necessary,

but was not always employed. There were boys living in Thornport, fourteen years old, that could with confidence steer a canal boat safely through these

A forest existed within the banks when the water was first turned in. It could not have been

long until the trees began dying and taking on the

appearance of a deadening so commonly seen

throughout the country at that period. Giant trees

soon stood leafless and twigless, with their bodies

and outstretched arms smooth from the loss of their

bark through decay. They rotted at the water's

surface and fell and drifted shoreward. They form-

ed what might be termed a corduroy platform, a

dozen or more yards in width, around the edge of

the lake. This condition lasted up into the seven-

ties, ending in their complete decay.

Seven miles of devious turns and bumps, 'Mid tussock'd islands, logs and stumps.

At times, when without a pilot, the canal boatmen would lose the channel and land upon a stump. A line would then be run out, and with a couple of half hitches thrown around another stump or tree, they would pull themselves off by a simple arrangement called a "Spanish Windlass."

But back to the North Bank tow path. In <u>The Story Of Buckeye Lake</u> the author says (p. 54) "Boats after leaving the canal at Minthorns [North of Seller's Point near where the canal meets the lake] had good towing one and one-half miles east, after which they took to the channel proper, amid stumps and logs before mentioned, and were propelled by the use of long poles."

becomes apparent that, yes, it really reading it So after all this tow path along which the canal boats were towed been to about our Eastport, passing at one point between the Seller's Point stone, North Bank wall and a high spot or bar once known as sunken island called Watkins Island, the site filled higher and and later they headed out However, at the end of the dam, where the old park sits, into the lake by pole power to navigate between the stumps, not too much different from the challenge of today's sailboat racing. Yes, Don Hardy, it appears that for a century and a half people have navigated from the site of BLYC out into Buckeye Lake hoping to avoid the stumps. The names and people were different, but the game was the same.
