As they entered the village, their sacks were so heavy the men were almost doubled over with the weight. They couldn't explain it, but each knew it was good somehow. As they came to the doors of their houses, the weight became almost unbearable.

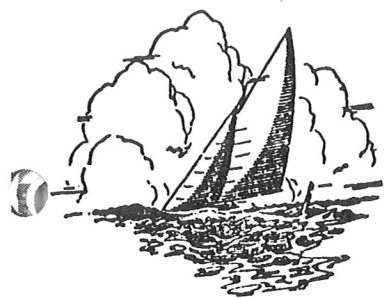

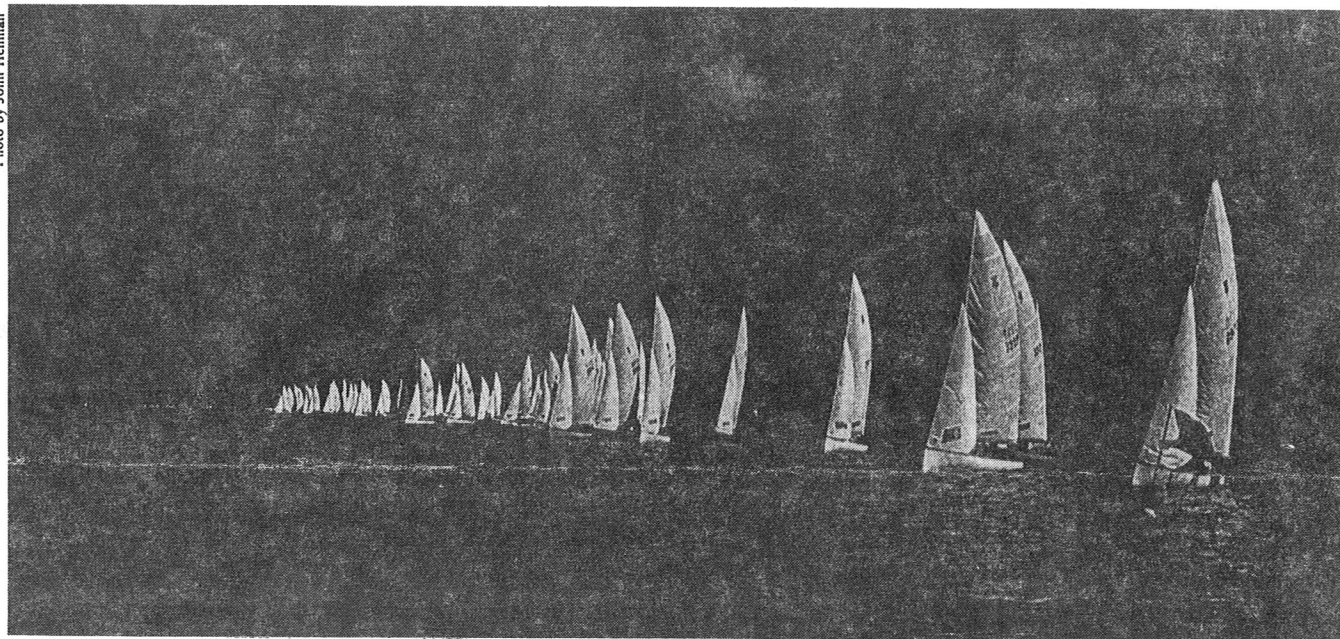


RACE AND REGATTA

Two-time national champion Barbehenn finished fifth overall.

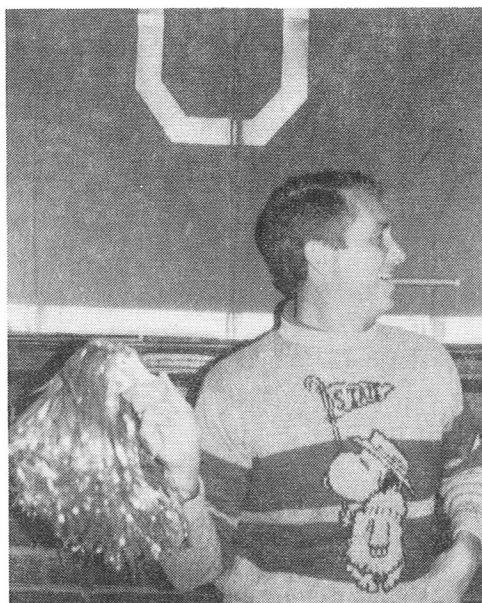

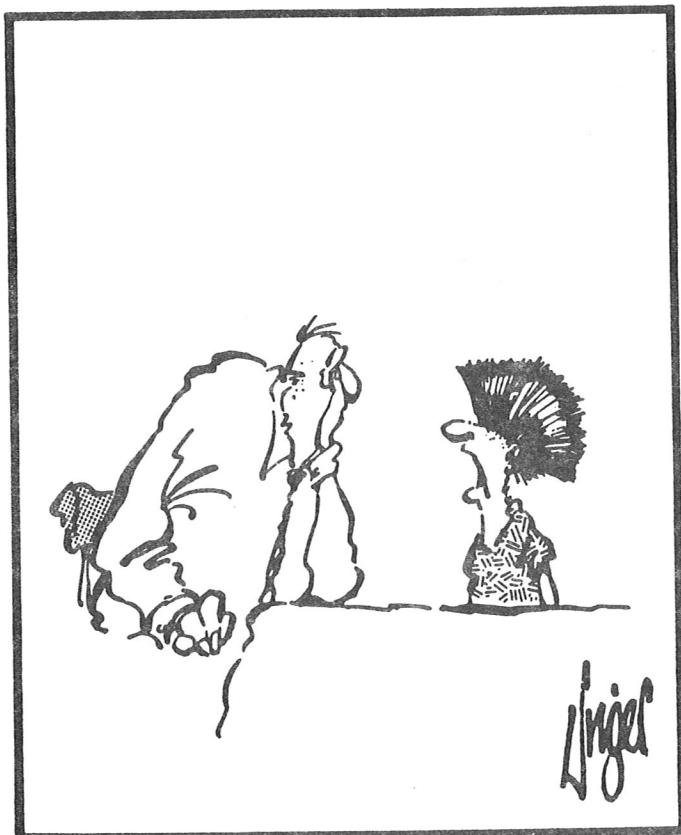
1. The amount of wind will vary inversely with the number and experience of the people you take on board.
