We are considering a lock system for the front gate. Governor McBride and Trustee Wolf are working on this project.


Approval has been given to the Ladies Auxiliary for a night at the races April 23. It sounds like great fun.

THE WAY WE WERE

The history of the Log goes back over half a century. I was recently given a September, 1926 issue of the Log in remarkably good condition. It was a gift to the BLYC History Department by Warren Weiant, who is currently a member of the club and whose father was a member long before that. I have placed this Log on display in the history cabinet in the Commodores' Lounge, including copies of its interior pages. It is marked Vol. II, No. 6 so it must be the second year of its publication.

When you come to the club read the articles and look at the several photographs of speed boat races, courtesy of the Columbus Citizen. Read the ad for Miss Buckeye, Buckeye Lake's champion speed boat then available for passenger service by its captain, Fred Sayre. The ad says "Telephone Fink's Landing, one block east of the yacht club". Where is Fink's Landing? Is it at Sayre's present location?

One thing particularly caught my eye. Collections to buy things for the club are not new, but this one is particularly interesting to me:

A MARINE CLOCK

For many years the members have expressed the wish that the Club be equipped with a real clock which would strike the ships time, thus lending a more salty tinge to the island air.

All hopes have been in vain, but it seems that the wish needed only the impetus of some active members and just recently definite steps have been taken which will result shortly in the installation of this fine chronometer.

A Clock Fund has been started and a tentative order has been placed with the Chelsea Clock Company and the clock is now under construction. The Master Clock will be placed in the Lounge, probably over the fire place, and will be connected electrically with an eight inch bell which will be installed outside the building, probably on the lake side of the house. The clock will indicate the exact time, corrected hourly, and each half hour the bell will sound the ship time.

Beneath the Master Clock a plate will be erected showing the names of those who have made contributions, and while the fund has been given a generous start it is by no means complete and everyone interested in the installation is urged to promptly make their contribution to either Frank Miller, Doctor Winders or the Commodore.

It is certain that this improvement will be the most interesting in many years and the earlier the fund is complete the more soon we will all have the pleasure of seeing and hearing the clock in operation. George Pierce doesn't get much out of his racing but practice.

Shower

Heeling

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
