Oh my goodness I'm talking about September. It doesn't seem possible that my year as Commodore is coming to an end. September 3 is our Labor Day Party. This weekend is always a great weekend not only because of the fellowship but to us serious boaters it starts the beautiful fall season at Buckeye Lake. This is a quite time on the lake, but the best because trees are in full color which makes it the prettiest time of the year.

As you have noticed the club has been very busy as it should be, but we have a problem. Guests are allowed 3 visits a year. Not three visits per member but 3 visits in total for the year. If they come more than that they should pay for the privilege by becoming a member. Below is Article VI of the By-Laws which covers guest privileges



Section 1. (a) The family of a Member in good standing, including only his mother, wife, sons under sixteen years of age, and unmarried sisters and daughters, and the unmarried recognized regular woman or girl companion of an unmarried Member in good standing, and no other person, will as guests or a guest or a guest of the Member be entitled at all time to Guest Privileges, as defined in Section 3 of this Article, without holding guest cards or card.

(b) OCCASIONAL GUESTS. Persons other than those explicitly mentioned in paragraph (a) of this Section will, as occasional guests of a Member in good standing, be entitled occasionally to Guest Privileges, as defined in Section 3 of this Article; **but no person residing within a radius of fifty miles from the Club Premises, and who is eligible to membership in the Club, shall be a guest on said premises more than three times in any one year. Such an occasional guest of a Member must be accompanied on the Club Premises by his or her host Member or by such Member's guest or guest's explicitly mentioned in Paragraph (a) of this Section;** provided that such an occasional guest holding a guest card does not need to be so accompanied.

(c) DISTINGUISHED PERSONS, as adjudged by and at the discretion of the Governors, may as guests of the Club be extended Guest Privileges during their stay at Buckeye Lake.

Section 2. (a) A GUEST CARD MAY BE ISSUED to a guest of a Member only if and when said guest is eligible to membership in the Club and resides outside a radius of fifty miles from the Club Premises; and a guest card may be issued to a distinguished person, as adjudged by and at the discretion of the Governors.

(b) A guest card shall be issued to an applicant for membership in the Club whose application has been received but not acted upon by the Governors.

(c) Each guest card must bear the name and residence address of the guest to whom it is issued, must show the period during which it is valid and be validated by the signature of the Commodore, Secretary, or chairman of the House Committee; and a guest card issued to the guest of a Member must bear also the name of such Member.

(d) The period of validity of a guest card shall be limited to seven consecutive days, except as may be approved otherwise by the Governors, and except as provided in paragraph (c) of Section 1 or Article II hereof with respect to a guest card issued to an applicant for membership in the Club.

(e) A guest card shall not be transferrable to nor shall it be held by any person other than the one to whom it is issued.

Section 3. (a) GUEST PRIVILEGES consist only of Common Privileges, as defined in subparagraph (2) or paragraph (a) of Section 1 of Article I hereof; and of the privilege to use the Club's bedroom accommodations, subject to provisions of rules and regulations adopted by the Governors.

(b) Each guest must act and conduct himself or herself in a manner consistent with requirements prescribed for the acts and conduct of Members as provided in these By-Laws.

(c) A guest shall under no circumstances extend any privileges of the Club to any other person; except that a guest holding a valid guest card may be accompanied on the Club Premises by members of his immediate family, or, if he is unmarried, he may be accompanied by his unmarried recognized woman or girl companion.

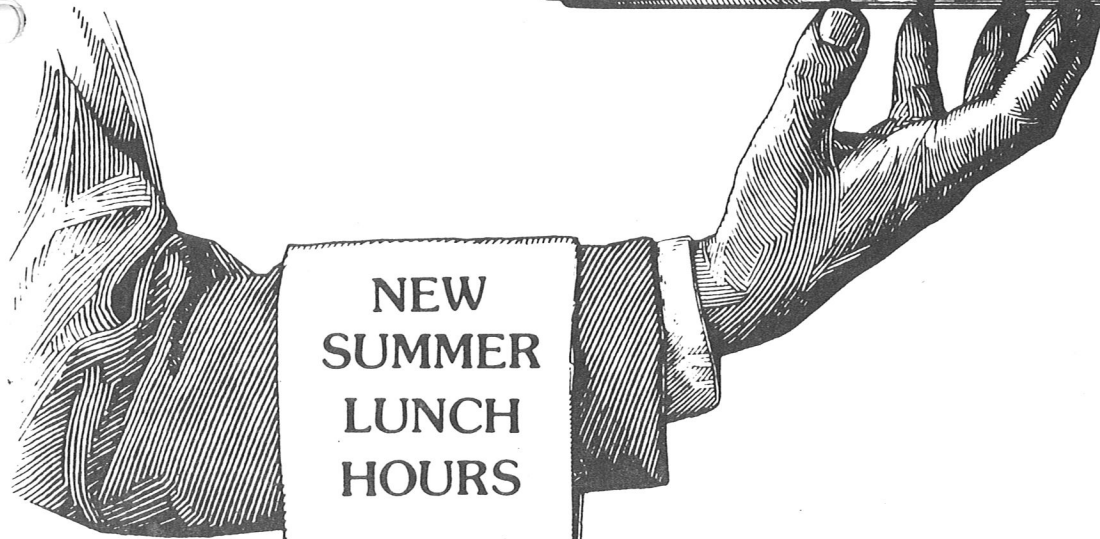

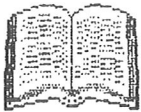

ARTICLE X OF THE BLYC CONSTITUTION REQUIRES THAT A PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE BYLAWS MUST BE PRESENTED AT A MEETING OF GOVERNORS, APPROVED BY THAT BOARD FOR PUBLICATION IN THE LOG, AND HAVE ITS SUBSTANCE PUBLISHED IN THE LOG AT LEAST ONE WEEK BEFORE THE BOARD CONSIDERS THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS WILL CONSIDER AT ITS NEXT MEETING AN AMENDMENT CHANGING THE DEFINITION OF A NON-RESIDENT MEMBER TO EXCLUDE FROM ELIGIBILITY FOR NON-RESIDENT MEMBERSHIP THOSE PEOPLE WHO LIVE WITHIN SEVENTY-FIVE MILES FROM THE CLUB PREMISES FOR MORE THAN EIGHT WEEKS DURING A YEAR REGARDLESS OF WHERE THEIR LEGAL "RESIDENCE" IS.

IF YOU HAVE ANY COMMENTS, PLEASE CONTACT A MEMBER OF THE BOARD.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS-ARTICLES I

SECTION 6. (a) NON-RESIDENT MEMBERS ARE ONLY PERSONS RESIDING OUTSIDE A RADIUS OF SEVENTY-FIVE MILES FROM THE CLUB PREMISES AND NOT TEMPORARILY RESIDING WITHIN THE AFORESAID RADIUS FOR MORE THAN EIGHT WEEKS DURING THE FISCAL YEAR, EACH OF WHOM MUST BE AT LEAST TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF AGE; AND EACH IS ENTITLED TO THE SAME PRIVILEGES AS THOSE OF AN ACTIVE MEMBER EXCEPTING ELECTORAL PRIVILEGES.

(b) IF AND WHEN A NON-RESIDENT MEMBER BECOMES A RESIDENT WITHIN A RADIUS OF SEVENTY-FIVE MILES FROM THE CLUB PREMISES OR CEASES TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR NON-RESIDENT MEMBERSHIP, HIS MEMBERSHIP SHALL TERMINATE AUTOMATICALLY. UNLESS . . .

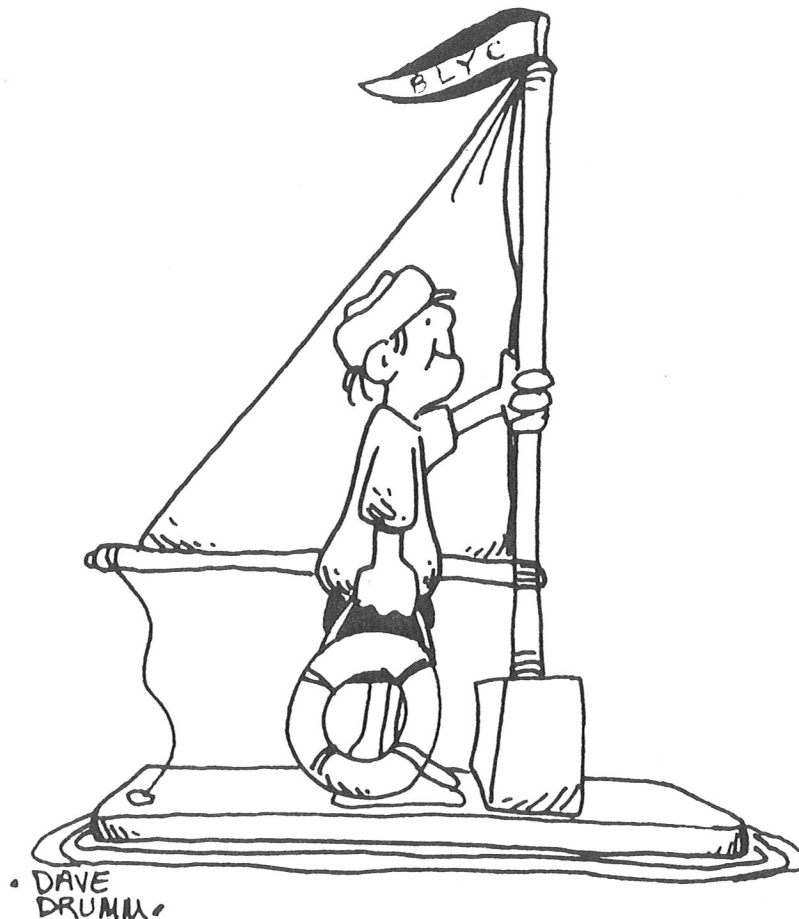
Hostesses Jan Kerr and Lexie Montague were thanked for a splendid job and the meeting was then adjourned. A social hour followed.

GOV. PAT PATTERSON

North by Northeast

All sails are set, and they are all pulling nicely—the big genoa, the staysail, the main, and the little mizzen balancing it all.

It has been like this all night long, a spanking southwesterly of 15 knots off the port quarter, enough to give us a good turn of speed but not enough to give the Atlantic waves any real punch in their 8-mile fetch from the New Jersey coast. They impart just a little corkscrew effect to keep the helmsman awake in this dogwatch hour right before dawn.

This has been one of the rare perfect passages along the Jersey coast where any wind from the east can make the Atlantic mighty unpleasant and render the few inlets dangerous to enter.

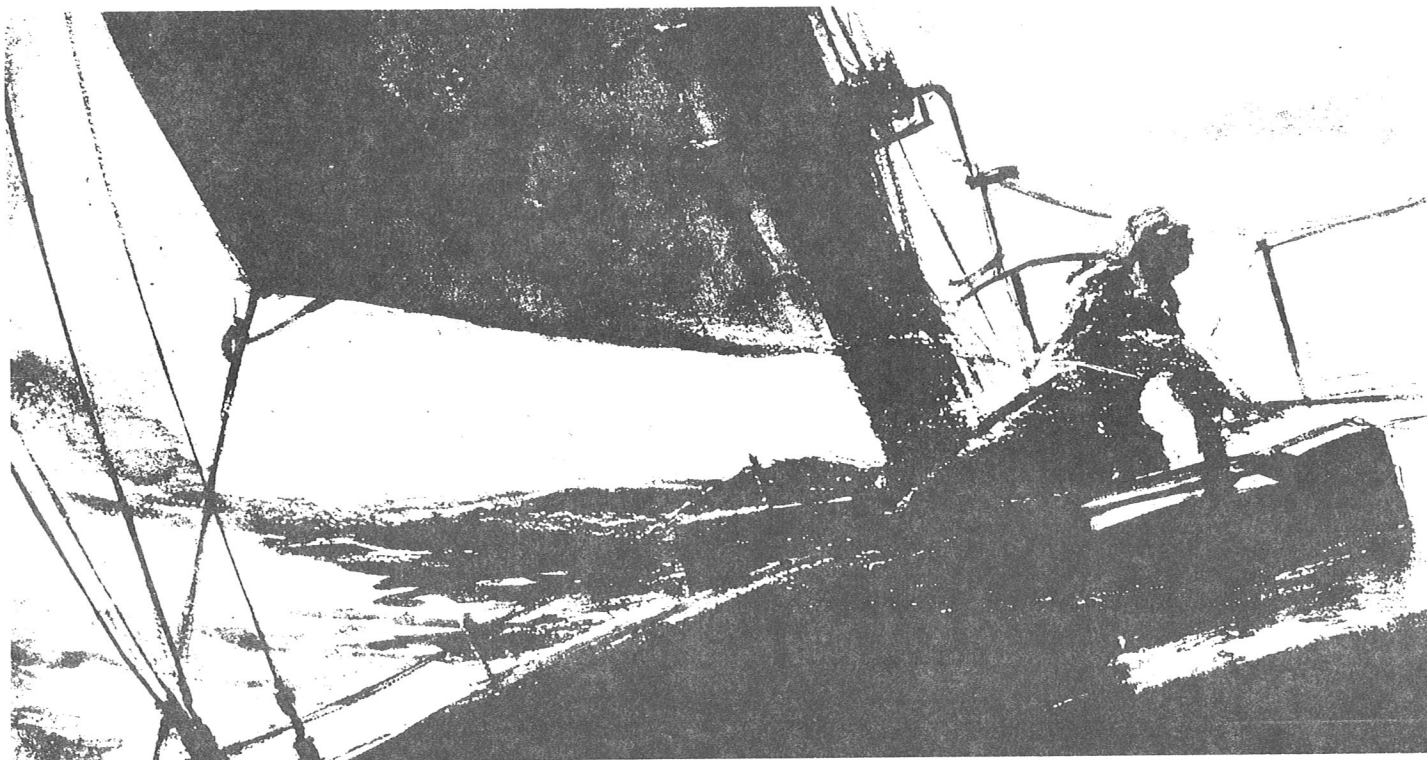
On this night I'm sure that fresh in my crew's memory is one of my memorable command decisions. A few months before, on our fall southbound passage, I de-

cided to seek shelter from an approaching hurricane by running the inlet at Atlantic City.

This was an arguable decision, as my crew's lively discussion proved. But I considered the alternative worse, and it was I—oh, the loneliness of command—who had to issue the ultimate order, the order we all had the right at that moment to consider one possibly of life or death.

It usually would be safer to ride out a hurricane at sea, but lured by a highly erroneous weather forecast (for which the weather bureau actually broadcast an apology the next day—a first in my memory), we already were so close to shore when the storm struck that I believed that clawing our way back out to deep water was likely to be the less successful, or to put it more succinctly, the more dangerous, option.

Not exactly comforting was the knowledge that the



shoals we were fast approaching had been littered over the centuries with the carcasses of ships whose masters had failed their final crises here.

So there we were, running down on the inlet, the sandy shoals ready to trap us if we missed the narrow channel between the granite breakwaters. The driving rain blinded us as we strained to find those fingers of rock in the wind-driven scud that at times was as thick as fog.

With 45 to 50 knots of wind blowing directly down that opening and 20- to 30-foot following waves threatening to send us uncontrollably tumbling down their forward walls, our only course was to tack down toward the channel. But with each tack we lost ground, sideways, toward those breakwaters.

With our situation about as precarious as it could get, our reefed staysail let go, and a moment later the mizzen sheet parted. That left our engine to do the job.

"When you are seemingly alone out there, being tossed about by the wild Atlantic, it is not good to dwell on the fact that only an hour's sail away, right through those inlets and protected by New Jersey's long barrier beach, stretches . . . Barnegat Bay, and on its . . . calm waters hundreds of sailboats . . . are cavorting with unworried abandon"

For 10 frightening, seemingly endless, minutes Wyntje fought to clear the breakwater. Now it was just a hundred yards to the comparative safety on the other side of those jagged rocks, but each succeeding wave threatened to crash us down upon them.

And then, suddenly, it was done. We skimmed the rocks with only feet to spare and gained the safety of the calmer waters inside the inlet.
