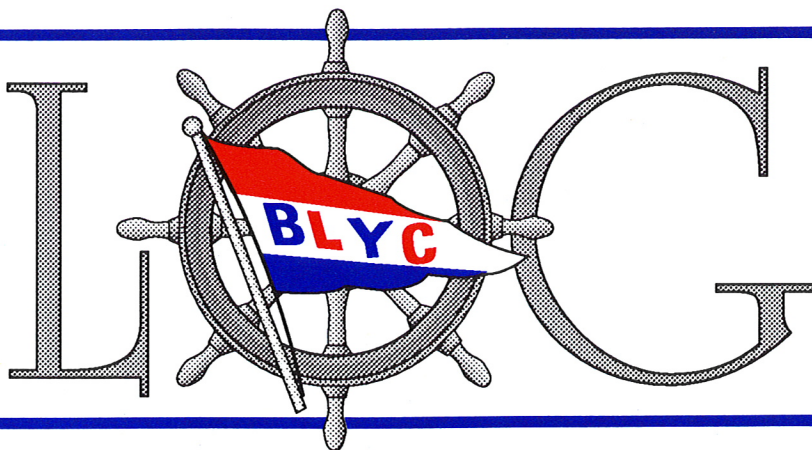

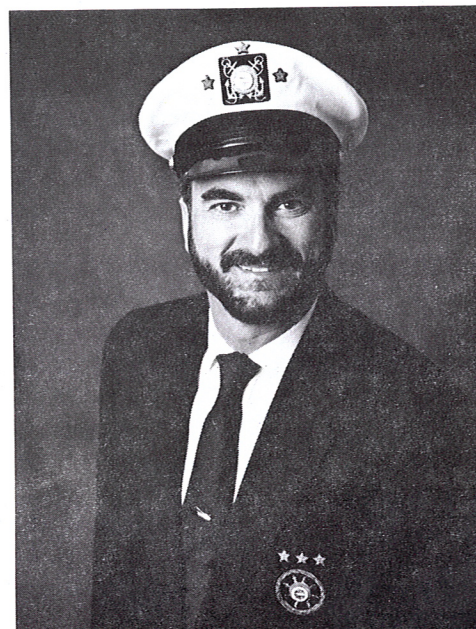
FROM THE BRIDGE ☆ ☆ ☆

RACE & REGATTA

I gathered the following information from "America's Cup '92," the official Program put out by "Yachting" magazine.

The America's Cup

In 1851 the first America's Cup was won by New York Yacht Club in the schooner "America" which sailed against 16 British sailboats around the Isle of Wight off the coast of England. For the next 132 years the Cup never left the U.S. In 1983 Dennis Connor, sailing against the wing tipped keel of Australia II, lost the Cup and ended the longest domination of any one sport by a country. He retrieved the Cup in 1987 by defeating the Australians and it now is back "home" in the U.S.A..

Defending the Cup

The U.S. selects a defender through the America's Cup Organizing Committee (ACOC). The ACOC organizes 3 sets of round robin match racing (match racing is one-on-one competition) sailed January 14-26, February 8-18, and March 3-17 with each racer receiving points only for wins. In the first set, each win is worth 1 point. In the second, each win is worth 2 points, and in the third, each race is worth 4 points. The scoring is weighted this way so that adjustments and experimenting in the first rounds of racing don't have a big affect on the point's total, which encourages experimenting to increase boat speed. A semifinal series is being sailed from March 28 to April 12 and a defender is chosen through a final series to be raced from April 17 to May 2.

Challenging the Cup

The rest of the world selects a challenger through a series of races set up by the Challenger of Record Committee (CORC). The winning boat of a series of races very similar to the series raced by the defenders, with the early races having a lower point value than the later races, is the challenger and wins the Louis Vuitton Trophy. The remaining dates for the challengers are the semi-finals from March 29 to April 9 and the finals from April 20 to April 29.

The America's Cup Races

The Challenger will meet the Defender in a best of 7 races beginning May 9, 1992.

Trivia

Japan and Italy may spend as much as \$100,000,000 (That's right one hundred million dollars) on their quest for the cup. When Australia's Darling Harbor will spend a mere \$12,000,000 on their quest, America's has a budget of about \$40,000,000 to spend thanks in part to the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club. A totally equipped boat runs along the lines of \$3,000,000. A new mast comes in at around \$650,000 and a new carbon fiber spinnaker pole is a mere \$90,000. As you can see, a few miscellaneous expenses can add up rather quickly, especially considering the America's syndicate now has 4 different boats.

By the time you receive this issue of the Log, the Challenger and Defender Semifinals will be nearly over. The Challenger Finals run from April 20 to April 29, and the Defender finals are from April 17 to May 2. Some of these races may be shown on ESPN on their America's Cup Update shows. The actual America's Cup races will be on ESPN in their entirety beginning with the first race on May 9. This is a best of seven series and the other dates are May 10, 12, 14 and on the 16, 17, 19 if needed.

Why Write About The America's Cup ?

I have written this article for several reasons.

First the most important reason to stimulate some interest in sailing and sailboat racing is the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club. I recall when I was about 10 years old I began taking sailing lessons at BLYC. That was 1978. Willy Petersilge was the instructor at sailing camp. Now Willy Petersilge may not be all that familiar a name now but it was then. Willy is the son of Commodore Carl and Marian Petersilge and the year before he had represented BLYC at Junior Bay Week. With his crew of Dan Dressel, son of

Commodore Jim and Nancy Dressel, and Dan Roshon, son of Commodore Gale Roshon, they won. Not only did they win but they went on to Dallas, Texas, and won the Sears National Championship.

That same year a boy named Lon Mover from BLYC became a Smythe Quarterfinalist. That very same year our representatives in the Bemis also moved on to the quarterfinals. This would be equivalent to going to Junior Bay Week at Put-In-Bay and winning all three events.

The names of our representatives to the Bemis that year should be little more familiar. The skipper was a current member of the Board of Governors, Steve Rehbein-Beeson, stepson of Jack Beeson and son of Peg Beeson.

I haven't named Steve's crew yet because this brings me to my second reason for writing about the America's Cup. You may have been greeted during the summer months by this person's grandparents as you came up the ramp out of the parking lot or



played poker with his grandfather. His parents stay in the same duplex cottage and you may have seen them enjoying a warm summer day on their porch as you cross the bridge to the Yacht Club. He is the grandson of Commodore Bob and Doris Dye and the son of Commodore Mike and Joan Hein.

His name is Mike Hein II. You may be asking yourself why did I make revealing that name so dramatic. It's because Mike Hein II is a crew member in the America's Cup³ Syndicate, and it appears as though he could be part of the team that represents the U.S. in the most prestigious and dramatic sailing events in the world, the "America's Cup". Some of you may or may not be familiar with his name. If not, perhaps it is because Mike has not been around BLYC a lot lately but that's because he has been racing sailboats all around the world. He is now part of the team working to defend the America's Cup. As you read this article, remember that Mike got his start sailing and racing on Buckeye Lake, so if you have children or grandchildren perhaps they would like to take sailing lessons too.

I think I can speak for everyone at BLYC when I say we are proud to have a member like Mike representing BLYC as well as the United States in the America's Cup. I, for one, am quite envious.

This brings me to my third and final reason for writing about the America's Cup. Like my first reason, I hope to stimulate sailing and racing at BLYC. And like my second reason, I have to go back a few years to begin.

In 1987 a very large hole was being dug where I used to go to play on the swing, play tether ball, or just dig in the sand pile. Although I still do those same things, I can no longer do them when people are watching. I knew I was losing my old playground for a good reason though, because I was getting a swimming pool in its place.

As the hole was being dug for the new BLYC swimming pool, an old item was turned up from out of the ground. It was a disgustingly rusty old thing that (those of you who know my father will appreciate this) my father salvaged. 1987 was also the year Dennis Connors won the America's Cup back from the Australians after losing it to them in 1983. This event (Dennis Connors' win, not finding the rusty thing) stimulated a great interest in sailboat racing and match racing in particular.

Since the America's Cup was on every sailor's mind and since we had an old rusty thing it was decided among the racing members of the Cruising Fleet that we would have our own America's Cup and name it after an old rusty thing salvaged from the depths of Buckeye Lake. Hence, the Rusty Rudder was born.

It was an ugly thing being buried for God knows how long. The

crustiest old sailors became nauseous and young children were brought to tears upon a mere glance at it. We welded a metal rod to it which was stuck into a hole in a piece of driftwood and nestled in the bushes that are on the way out to the race shack.

Since we were Pioneering new territory at Buckeye Lake, we proceeded with caution. Our goal was to make the Rusty Rudder as prestigious and dramatic an event as its counterpart, the

America's Cup. There were a few small things we were forced to change. Instead of \$3,000,000 Yachts, we decided upon \$10,000 MacGregor 25 Sailboats. Instead of inviting the entire world to compete, we decided to keep it a little more local and exclusive and include only BLYC members. Instead of having 5 different series of races lasting 5 months, we decided to do it all in one weekend.

After countless hours of hashing out problems and making decisions, we decided it had been a busy morning and we would get

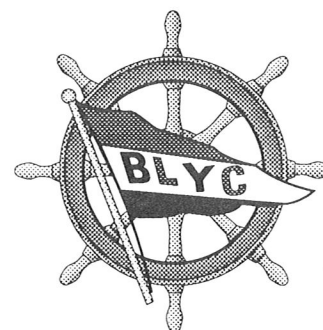
some lunch and a few beers. We were finally ready for the big event.

A weekend in May of 1987 was chosen and after a double elimination series of about 4 boats, Tom Eisert as skipper and Ryan Eisert as crew, emerged as the first ever victors of the coveted Rusty Rudder. After it was all over, we looked back on what we had built and were quite proud.

This is where it starts to get a little arrogant !!

In the years following that first great event, a new name in the world of the Rusty Rudder emerged and became dominant force. That name was none other than TEAM FOSTER (a team consisting of Frank H. Foster III and Frank H. Foster IV) who secured victories in '88, '89 and in '90. There were no worthy challengers in the year of 1991 and thus no races were held.

I, therefore, issue this challenge to anyone who dares to ponder it. 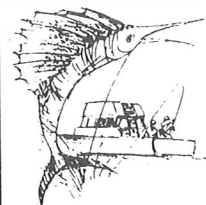
