We will also have 2 brunches this month as well as Bridge on the 14TH. So, please check your calendar for all our upcoming events and support your club.





EPISODE 2 THE EUROPEAN SETTLERS ARRIVE

In 1751, a generation before the Revolutionary War, the first European known to have seen the Big Pond was Christopher Gist. He camped on its shores, fished its waters and trapped in its enveloping marshes and forests.

After that war, the young federal government set aside the Refugee Tract, running along what is now refugee road for about 40 miles east from the Scioto River and about four and one half miles wide, to reward refugees from Canada and Nova Scotia and their widows and families for their volunteered aid to the Colonies in conflict with the British and therefore no longer welcome north of the new border. The area of the Big Swamp and its Pond, about mid-way across the Tract, was surveyed by

Elnathan Schofield. He completed a map in 1801 which showed the pond in the middle of the swamp to be about five miles long with an average width of about one sixth of a mile. The swamp itself followed very roughly the present shoreline of Buckeye Lake. The pond's outlet, which the aboriginal Indians called Mingo Run, was, according to Comm. Armstrong's text, in about the same location as the new dam just to the west of the yacht club on the north bank. However, his map puts it about where the yacht club is or even slightly to the east.

The refugees came and had settled about a third of the tract, including some of the shores of the Big Pond, by the time the map was completed in 1801, two years before Ohio became a state. Most of the settlers selected hill sections for their future homes avoiding the malaria-like fever of the swamp. Some, however, were more courageous and perhaps more romantic. They braved the mosquitoes to be near the Big Pond.

Among the settlers were people whose names still live to mark places around the lake. In 1820 Thomas Minthorn built a log cabin just north of Minthorn bay. From his doorstep he shot wild turkeys robbing this corn patch in the clearing. He killed deer in the surrounding forests. From one of his

big trees he burned and hewed a dugout canoe from which he fished in the Big Pond. But his principal occupation was clearing and farming his rich land. The soils were deep and fertile. Where they could be readily drained, such as between the Big Pond and the South Fork of the Licking River, the marshy areas were converted to workable black muck high in productivity. Crops in the region were tremendous.

By the time Ohio became a state in 1803, much of the land around the Big Pond had been cleared for agriculture. Produce from the fields, forests, marshes and waters was much beyond the needs of the sparsely populated region. There was more than enough to fill the requirements of small processors and manufacturers in the area who could use these raw materials. There were surpluses. But with all this abundance the people had to wear homespuns, buckskins and other homemade, crude frontier clothing. Their buildings, furniture, utensils, tools, and everything needed to eat, drink, wear and use were home grown or home made or produced locally, except the old worn out articles they had brought with them from their old homes.




