EPISODE 4 CANAL AND LAKE CONSTRUCTION COMPLETED, LANDMARKS

In 1830, five years after the ground breaking and accompanying celebration at Licking Summit, the enlarged Big Pond was filled and ready to furnish water to lift canal boats over the Licking-Scioto divide. The name was changed to the "Licking (Summit) Reservoir". The canal was open northward to Lake Erie and three years later, after the deep cut was completed, just south of Millersport [students: go look at it today, think about how we said they made it and you can see why it took another three years opening the canal to the Ohio River].

At this time the west end of the Licking Reservoir was an embankment extending from Seller's Point south about two thirds across the lake and then turning south westerly to Fisher's Island near the current Fisher's Marina accessible from Lieb's Island. The canal ran along the west side of that embankment and water was fed into the canal at the location of the hole in the wall at the end of Seller's Point. The high water level of the Licking Reservoir stood about eight feet above the canal water level. That embankment, later partially bulldozed down, is still there, visible on maps of the lake and occasionally at low water catching a powerboat propeller or causing a sailboat to go aground.

A couple of years later the north embankment gave way in the vicinity of Black Diamond Bend [stand at BLYC, look west. Black Diamond Bend is just east of the first point visible on the northbank which is Stony Point]. The

basin drained, overflowing into the adjoining lowlands and on to the South Fork of the Licking River. The embankment was earthen and the effect of waves on such a large body of water had not been foreseen. The broken embankment was rebuilt and measures were needed to prevent a repeat of the drainage. Surfacing of the inner slope with riprap didn't work because the rocks just slid and rolled down the bank to the bottom. So 10,000 wagon loads of stone, quarried about six miles to the east, were hauled over the road to Hebron, loaded on the barges and floated to the reservoir. The stones were roughly squared and carefully laid from bottom to top on the water side of the embankment . You can still see them at the BLYC Eastport, although the state knocked the top off a few years ago.

Soon it became apparent that the water supply would be inadequate to lift the increasing traffic of barges and packets over the Licking-Scioto Divide. A feeder was constructed from the South Fork of the Licking River, just north of Kirkersville, across the valley and along the northern slope of the Licking-Scioto Divide and into the west end of the Licking Reservoir. Since the reservoir was to the east of the canal, the water had to pass through an aqueduct built high enough over the canal to let boats pass under it. After construction, the water was turned into the feeder but the slope was too little to cause free flow into the reservoir. The aqueduct couldn't be lowered or canal boats would be unable to pass beneath it. The problem was solved by creating a new embankment (now called the west bank) to form a "New Reservoir" with the same surface level as the old. The feeder was diverted to the new reservoir. Additional locks were built at Minthorn Bay and at the Deep Cut for the added height and the reservoir was extended eastward. A channel was opened at the Hole-In-The-Wall to form a hole in the embankment through which canal craft could now enter the Licking Reservoir and eventually go to Thornport allowing the

top of the northbank to become a "tow-path". The original north embankment extended from the canal at Sellers Point eastward to Crane Bay, current site of the new state park. It was constructed from dirt pushed up from its southern side so its borrowpit formed a ready made channel along our "towpath" to Crane Bay. From there to Thornport a channel was opened out in the middle of the basin over the bed of the Big Pond and through adjacent marshy areas over which products from that area could be shipped.

I am going to be looking for individuals to help me this summer in running the races at the Club. If you know of someone or you yourself would like to help, please let me know.




