EPISODE 6 - THE IRON HORSE ENDS THE CANAL DAYS AND THE LAKE TURNS TO RECREATION

Before the first canal was completed in 1830, the only way to get to the lake was on foot, on an animal or in a vehicle pulled by an animal. From then until 1875, there was also the water route. All required brute strength and none were speedy. Land approaches were often so mired as to be nearly impassable. While the National Road from Wheeling, through Hebron to Columbus was constructed concurrently with he canal, it remained ungraded and ungraveled making for uncertain journeys. The canal access was limited. So travel to the Lake for recreation wasn't popular or all that pleasant.

The first railroad arrived in 1875 when the Straitsville Railroad was laid along the northeastern shore of the lake going past Avondale and through Thornport on its way from Newark to the coal fields of southern Perry County. Six years later others came from Toledo, through Granville and Hebron, along the west shore to Millersport and beside the Canal to Thurston.

Now with railroads in place, people could make a journey to the lake regardless of soggy, slimy roads. People from Columbus and other communities could enjoy a day on the water and make the round trip in the same 24 hour period. Trainloads of excursionists, drawn by iron horses, came for holiday and teekend outings. Hotels were built at anyondale and Lakeside, where rails approached the water, to accommodate visitors who wished to spend more than a day. From various rail stations new

trails were cleared to other points along the shores. At the ends of some were old farmhouses taking in guests. Soon cabins, cottages and new hostelries sprang up along and at the ends of the trails. Existing boat livery men rejuvenated and increased their fleets and landings multiplied. Livery stables were established in Thornport, Millersport and Hebron to provide hack service and drive it yourself horses and buggies, so that visitors could get from rail stations to their lakeside destinations. By 1900, the lake was well established as "The Playground of Central Ohio". There was an amusement park at the end of the trail from Hebron. Captain Dell Fisher's little passenger steamers were making regularly scheduled runs from landing to landing. Sayre's Marina [by whatever name it was then known] was there around that time too, but you will need to ask Bud for the exact founding date. BLYC wasn't there yet, but the idea of a boating club was probably in some minds and must have been the subject of some conversations. BLYC would arrive soon too.

In 1894, the Ohio General Assembly reserved the Licking Reservoir as a public park to be known as Buckeye Lake but made no provisions to improve it. While the fisherman didn't mind, the boating enthusiasts were disappointed and impatient for progress. The new and growing recreation businesses and the public they served wanted the stumps and weeds cleared out of the water.

At that time the lake and the canals were under the authority of the Ohio Canal Commission. Canal craft were privately owned and paid fees and tolls to use the canal. In 1859 the state had come to have considerable profit from the canals but traffic was already declining. The state leased the canal to private interests who gave it up in 1877 leaving it in need of repair. Resuming operation, the Commission found itself in a losing battle with the railroads. But they resisted conversion of the lake to recreation. They said they needed to main-

tain the canals and the lake could not be cleared for recreation while maintaining the canal operation, the real purpose of the reservoir. By 1900 the Canal was through as a commercial waterway. Railroads had made the lake a resort. But the commission insisted that it must maintain the canals in readiness to pass commercial craft in the event any appeared. The lock tenders, toll collectors and maintenance crews were retained on the payroll up to 1910. The bureaucracy stood firm.

In 1898, George H. Watkins was made the Canal Superintendent. He had grown up in canal towns and had long been interested in them. With his leadership and influence, the tide of resistance to improving the lake slowly turned around. In 1902 the legislature transferred administration of the lake to the Canal Commission, the Board of Public works and the Chief Engineer acting jointly. The following year the Columbus, Buckeye Lake and Newark Traction Company brought its lines to the lake with convenient frequent schedules for its speedy cars. The resort became increasingly popular and pressure built for its improvement. Small boats of all kinds were plying the lakes old channels and limited open waters. Even a few sail boats appeared searching for a path among the snags and sometimes known as "stump skippers". Then in 1904 Watkins became a member of the Board of Public works. By 1904, under his leadership, plans for the improvement of the lake were completed and improvements soon began.

Sounds like a nice place and time to found a yacht club doesn't it? Between now and the next Episode, look at the plaque on the chimney in the dining room at the BLYC Clubhouse on Watkins Island. The plaque is in memory to George H. Watkins, the "Father of Buckeye Lake". Now you know why it is there, who he was and why our island is named after him.















