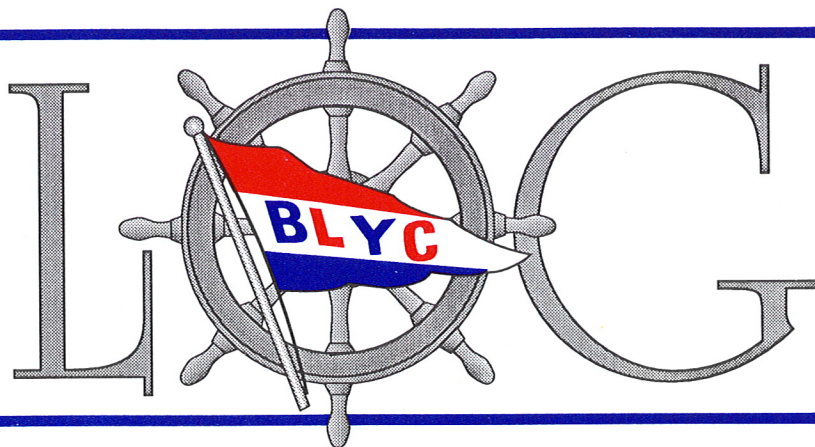

Rentals & Docks

As this year comes to a close, I want to thank those who supported my re-election. Although my primary responsibility was one of docks and rentals, as Governor I was also involved in many other phases of operating the Yacht Club. I have endeavored to represent the best interest of all members in all matters.

The houses, garages, rooms, and docks have been assigned and rents have been paid. There are very few unassigned docks. Anyone interested in any of the unassigned docks for the balance of this year and to be carried over for next year, should contact me immediately.

The docks have all been repaired, all electrical is now functioning and all docks have been numbered. Those docks that are now not desirable should be altered

to make them more usable.

It is obvious that the Club could use more docks. In conversations with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, permission for the expansion of docks at Eastport is the most readily available. A request for a permit for forty additional docks at Eastport has been submitted to the State. We would probably start out with twenty and add as demand requires. The plan is to build two piers perpendicular to the towpath and boat slips on both sides of each pier and perpendicular to the piers. The ultimate plan would be to extend the piers out as far as Area 8 extends into the lake. The financing and payment for these piers would come from the income of the docks and not from membership dues.

If you are looking for a place to store your boat and trailer, there are sixty-five spaces at Eastport. The storage area is surrounded with a high fence and kept locked. The rent is \$100.00 a space per year. Call me or leave word at the Yacht Club if you desire a storage space.

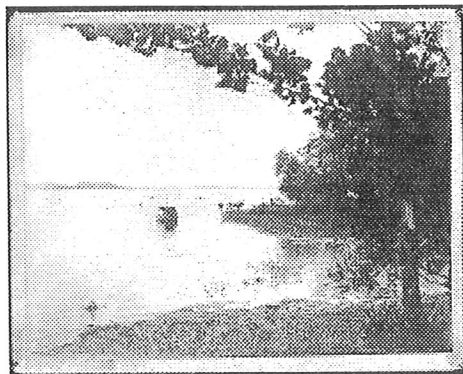
The Way We Were

Episode 7, The Buckeye Lake Yacht Club Is Founded

This month we hold elections, so its a good time to remember the founding of the BLYC and our very first elections. At the end of our last look at the lake, it was 1904 and the lake was being slowly cleared. Each autumn, when snake hunters, picnickers and boatmen were about to hole up for the winter, the work would start.



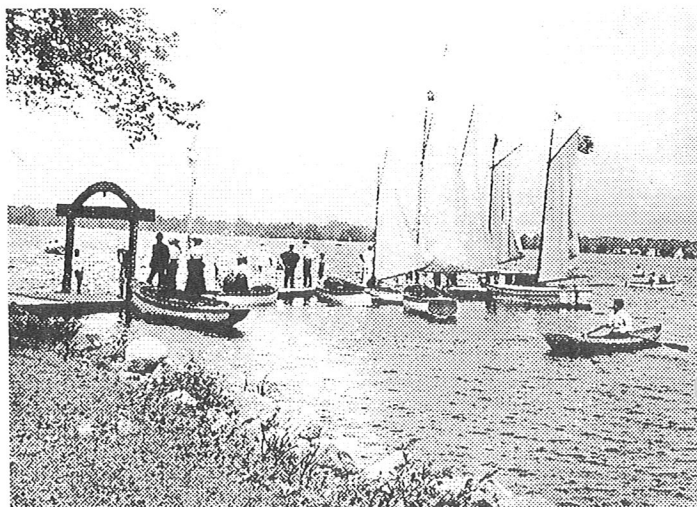
Lock gates and sluices were opened and the basin was drained. When the bed was dry enough, stumps were uprooted from shallows and after a hard freeze the ones in deeper water were cut off at ice level and left to sink after the melt. Stumps from the shallows were dragged over deeper water to accompany the sawn off ones. Work stopped with the spring thaw. Each spring, sportsmen were greeted by new channels or new boat landings. Many clubs were being formed at locations around the shore and on the islands. Of 20 listed by Comm. Kyle Armstrong, I recognize only one as remaining. Guess which one.

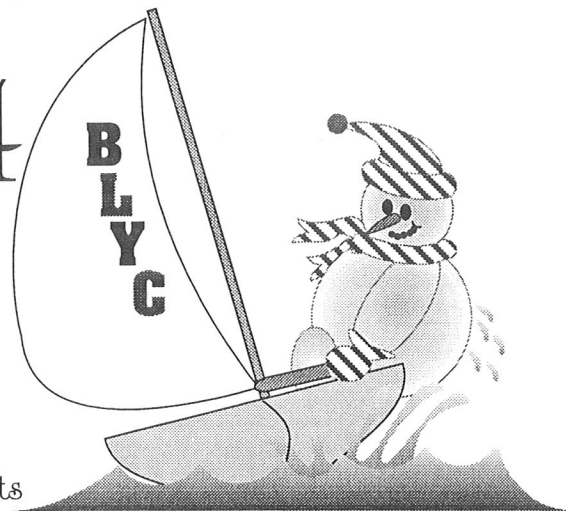
It was in April of 1906 when an article appeared in the morning edition of the Ohio State Journal (as in Journal Island) with the Headline: YACHTSMEN MEET AND FORM A CLUB. The night before, a lot a power and sail boat owners had organized a yet unnamed "yacht club" which would ply Buckeye Lake. Similar items appeared the same day in the Columbus Dispatch, Columbus Citizen Journal and the Newark American Advocate. The articles still referred to the lake as the Licking Reservoir, undoubtedly out of old habit. Then about two days later, the Toledo Press ran a story recognizing the long-standing rivalry between Toledo and Columbus in all things - except yachting. It said members of the Toledo Yacht Club were going to arrange to ship reservoirs of water to Columbus to flood the croquet ground of the Columbus club so they would have water for their yachting activity. The big water sailors didn't think much of our prospects for boating here.

On April 24, 1906, about forty out of 100 invited attended a meeting at Leachman's in Columbus. They had copies of the constitution and by-laws of the Maumee River Yacht Club, an Inter-Lake Yachting Association Manual and other information for starting their club. After feasting, refreshment and discussion, fifteen of them participated in the preliminary organization of a yacht club to be named later. Lawrence Sackett of Columbus was elected Commodore and James T. Haynes of Newark was treasurer. Two committees were named, one for preparing a constitution and by-laws and the other to select a name and design a burgee. During

the next eleven days, there were news releases and stories in the papers about an upcoming meeting at Col. Welles cottage on Orchard Island for further organization. All interested people were invited to attend. By meeting time on Sunday May 6, the club's membership had grown from 15 to 40. Aboard member's boats, about 60 members and prospects found their way from the park to Orchard Island. The day was not all business. The meeting was first and was held at Charles W. Miller's cottage where the promised lunch was served. The constitution was adopted and so was the name: THE BUCKEYE LAKE YACHT CLUB.

The club Burgee was adopted but was different than our current one. However, you can see a replica of it in the Commodores Lounge. Only those members who owned boats could be flag officers. A Board of Governors was elected and met the following week. They provided for an initiation fee of \$2.00 and annual dues of \$4.00 to be paid for each applicant after July 1, 1906. Anyone applying before that date was a charter member. There was more newspaper publicity but from that time on, the term "Licking Reservoir" was seldom seen in the press. The Club's first regatta was held on Memorial Day 1906. Most of the club's 40 craft were there decorated with flags and bunting, power boats towing sail boats. It was a parade, then power and sailboat races.

GOT THE URGE? HASN'T IT BEEN TOO LONG?

Not enough sailing, eh? It's time to get another BLYC BAHAMAS CRUISE together. Two of BLYC's biggest fools have put two such cruises together in the past (1988 and 1990), Jim McBride your cruise director and Frank Foster (the eldest), your treasurer and baggage director, and they have now joined forces to try it again. Come aboard BLYC BAHAMAS '95. You don't need to be a sailor. We already have several who are not. The trip looks very likely, judging by the number of people who said they are definite. Here is our tentative itinerary for February 1995 (when it's cold and ugly in Ohio) but it is subject to change from weather or other unforeseen causes:

- 3 Friday Depart Columbus and arrive in Nassau, Bahamas, spend Friday night in Nassau at a Motel near our boats at the Nassau Yacht Haven. Expect two couples per room so you can ease into the close quarters idea. (We wanted two people in a single bed to make it more realistic but decided not to)
- 4 Saturday Depart on board Saturday morning and sail to Allan's Cay where the endangered iguanas are (not a petting zoo but a bleak cay with a beautiful beach and good anchorage).
- 5 Sunday Sail to Norman's Cay which has snorkeling (bring your own equipment) and beaches to explore
- 6 Monday Sail to Staniel Cay, visit the village there, snorkel in and around the Thunderball Cave (movie scene filmed there), have dinner ashore at the Happy People Marina, (it was a very good dinner when Baggage Director Foster was last there) Figure around \$20 per dinner
- 7 Tuesday Sail to Pipe Creek
- 8 Wednesday Sail to Little Bell Island and explore the caves of the Rocky Dundas
- 9 Thursday Sail to Shroud Cay in the Exuma Cays Land and Sea Park
- 10 Friday Sail back to Nassau spend night on the boats
- 11 Saturday Return to Columbus

Our costs look approximately like this: Boats, meals on board, dockage, fuel, skipper and first mate, \$552; Airfare \$380 (you can deduct this if you will get yourself to Nassau on time); Motel on Friday the 3rd \$20; Jim and Frank's Discretionary Slush Fund for unexpected increases and expenses and possibly Tee shirts \$28 (don't expect to see this money again, you will be lucky to see Jim and Frank again) [If, there is any slush fund left, the group can decide what to do with it]); for a Grand Total of \$980. For that you get at least food on board prepared by the skipper and/or paid crew but not meals in any restaurants the group or you choose to visit (one is minimum), air fare, a bunk about the size of a large manila envelope and enough storage space for at least a 12 pack, all aboard a boat which is 42' (holding 6 of us) or 65 feet (holding 13 of us) and floats, at least when we leave. You bring your own spending money, booze (or buy it there) and your own companion (which you can, but better not, buy there). You may want to tip the Captain which is usual.

Send a check for \$ 50 per person with your name, address and telephone number to show you are interested. Make it out to Frank Foster, Cruise Treasurer, and mail it to him at 7632 Slate Ridge Boulevard, Reynoldsburg, OH 43068 or give it to Jim. If we have your money, we have your heart and serious interest. If we drop the trip, we will return your money. If you drop out or don't send us the rest of the money by the time we ask for it, we may return your money but we may not, no guarantees. We don't make any money on this deal so we sure don't want to lose any. If the trip goes, we will need another \$300 by Sept. 10 (we need to make deposits). We don't think we will need any more until the end of December when we expect to need the rest of it. This is not a luxury cruise but is a sailor's cruise. Ask around the club and you will find others who have been there who know what it is like e.g. Commodore Wolf, who plans to go again.

SOON COME MON, the Bahamian philosophy, applies to the third BLYC Bahamas Cruise. Don't be left on shore and in the cold.

BY-LAW AMENDMENT TO BE CONSIDERED BY BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Article X of the BLYC Constitution requires that the substance of a proposed By-law amendment be published

in the Log at least a week before the Board acts upon it in order to give interested members an opportunity to comment to Board members.

The Board will consider a motion to amend the By-laws to permit women to join as members and to make other changes which are consistent with and implement the philosophy of this change.

If this change is adopted, women will be permitted to join as members, vote, be a governor and a flag officer and have all rental privileges. If adopted, the Board is expected to also make other changes which are consistent with this change. For example, the Distaff membership, by which a widow of a member receives the privilege of club use at a low cost, will be discontinued, although existing

Distaff members will be grandfathered. Instead, a surviving spouse would succeed to the deceased spouse's membership by paying all outstanding obligations and future regular dues, but without paying an initiation fee. If one spouse joins, the immediate family will have unlimited guest privileges as now except that the member's mother and unmarried daughters over 21 (23 if in college) will no longer have such privileges. Like sons of members in the current By-Laws, daughters will be eligible for junior membership and must become members and pay regular dues at age 21 (23 if in college) to participate in club privileges. The spouse of a member will also be permitted to join by paying the initiation fee and dues.

First, it is never mandatory to make reservations at BLYC to dine in our dining room. However, the Club policy is to honor reservations first, and seat walk-ins when possible.

But why make reservations at all? For those Club members who know what time they want to eat, they can be assured of being seated within a few minutes of their reservation time. We will hold reservations for twenty minutes, and if a party has not arrived, we will seat the first party waiting on the waiting list.

Also consider as the quality of food and service improves, the busier the Club dining room is going to become. We have approximately 450 members and their wives. If only 20% of our membership should come for dinner, that means that we have to seat 180 Club members in a dining room that only seats 85 guests. If all 180 Club members wanted to eat at 7:00 p.m. or 7:30 p.m. (the most popular times) over half the membership would be disappointed. Also our kitchen is extremely small and poorly laid out for efficient service of large numbers of guests. Our kitchen staff works very hard, but because of severe space limitations, it is extremely difficult to efficiently prepare an extensive menu such as ours. The busiest night we have had for "Off The Menu" business was 135 guests. This means that on our busiest night we accommodated less than 10% of our membership.

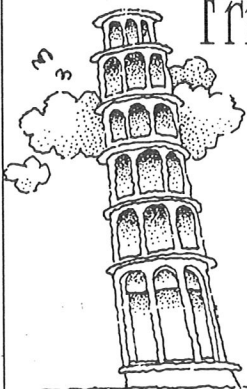
Reservations are for the Club members benefit. The Club management promises to maximize seating to benefit the Club and its members. We look forward to being of service to you and your guests.

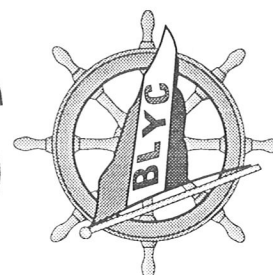
