

he last month has seen the loss of two of our long time club members - Jack Beeson and Commodore Bob Irwin. Jack, a member since 1963, was a dedicated sailor and he and his family were strong supporters of our sailing program. Commodore Irwin, a member since 1922, was one of our two living 50 year Commodores and, although not active in the Club in recent years, he made major contributions to the development and operation of the Club during his lifetime. We are all saddened by these losses and we will miss them.

We had an exceptionally good work day on October 16th. The weather was great and the turn-out of members willing to give up a beautiful Sunday for the

benefit of their Club was gratifying. Check the House & Grounds report in this Log for the details. Nice job Governor Oliver and a big thanks to all who helped out.

The Club's Oktoberfest is rapidly becoming one of our most popular annual parties. Held last year for the first time in recent history, this years response was almost overwhelming - some 290+ people. Since we had not published a cutoff for reservations in the Log or flyer and the weather forecast for the big event was ideal, we elected to add tables to the porch and move the band outside in order to accommodate as many reservations as possible. It was a little crowded but everyone seemed to have fun, and the food was great and plentiful. In order to reassure those members who are concerned about over-booking our parties, particularly in the winter when they must be held indoors, I wish to set the general rules which we plan to use this year to setting reservation and guest limits for the Club's parties. They are:

- 1. If the number of reservations for an indoor party is not expected to exceed 145, reservations will not be limited.
- 2. If the number of reservations for an indoor party is expected to exceed 145, then a reservation cap and maximum number of guests per member will be established. The level of the cap will be dependent on the type of party (whether there is dancing or not) and will be between 145 and 185. The reservation cap and guest limits will be published in the

Log and any flyers advertising the party.

- 3. Reservation and guest limits for parties where the porch and grounds of the Club can be used will be set and advertised on a case by case basis.
- 4. Where reservations are limited (as in 2. above), no reservations will be accepted without payment in full at the time of the reservation and reservations will be accepted on a first come first serve basis.

There are actually only two or three parties during the winter where we expect to have reservation caps. The objective is to make these parties available to members first and to provide the Club Manager with the information he needs to plan and put on the party in an efficient manner.

Much more is to come so please read this column every month so that you can be updated on all of our social events.

As noted by Commodore Debenport our most popular parties will require reservations with advance payment. This policy is to ensure that members have first choice for tickets for these exciting events. For the fall and winter, two specific events require special reservations. First the OSU Band Party to be held Saturday, November 12, beginning at 6:30 p.m. with hors d'oeuvres and a full buffet at 7:30 p.m. The cost is \$12.50 per person. We will limit the number of reservations to One Hundred Eighty-Five (185) persons. Members will be permitted to make advance reservations for no more than four persons. To secure reservations members will need to provide a check or credit card account number. Members will also be permitted to charge their ticket purchase on a club charge check. If a member chooses to use a club charge check he will be asked to sign the check when he arrives with his guests. Cancellation of reservations will be permitted with full refund.

However, the cancellation must occur by noon on Friday November 11.

If any tickets remain as of Friday November 4, they will go on sale to members on an unlimited first paid, first served basis.

The next party requiring special reservations will of course be New Year's Eve. We will ring in the new year with hors d'oeuvres at 6:30 p.m. and a sumptuous buffet at 7:30 p.m. We will be featuring a champagne fountain and the great dancing sounds of the Mojo Men. Breakfast will be served after midnight. The cost will be \$35.00 per person.

Each member may reserve up to four tickets for this very special event. The tickets must be paid for in advance by check or by a credit card number. If any tickets remain they will be made available on a first paid, first served basis as of Friday December 16. Cancellations with full refund will be honored but they must be made by noon Friday, December 16th.

We also will be featuring a series of

special dinner nights which will occur throughout the year. We are going to tax Hans' culinary skills to the limit. The first event will be a Hungarian Night scheduled for Friday November 18. We will be featuring a strolling Hungarian violinist.

On December 3 we have a scheduled Vienna Night. We will be featuring Viennese specials and Austrian waltzes will be the musical order of the day. Members will also be permitted to order off of the menu for the Vienna Night.




