

place at the Club in December. The lower level roofs on the two story rental house are all complete. The upper roof is in bad shape and should be replaced next fall. The potholes in the parking lot have been filled and compacted and three inches of new gravel has been added to the driving lanes. One other improvement that was made and you may have noticed when pulling into the

parking lot is the entry lanterns have green and red lenses. Now instead of buying colored bulbs we can use white long lasting energy saver lamps. Mike Niedig with Color Text Sign installed a film in the existing lenses at no charge to the Club. Mike is also working on a bid to us for supplying the permanent sign plaques to be mounted on the stone pillars. He should have a price to me before our next board meeting. Additionally, Byers Fence in Columbus has offered to donate some wrought iron fence to the Club. It would be installed between the entry pillar and the chain link fence along route 79. This fence is identical to what was used around Ameriflora. On a sad note, the docks at area 8 were a target of vandalism. The bubblers were kicked in the lake and most of the light fixtures broken out. Fortunately though, we were able to retrieve the bubblers from the bottom of the lake and reinstall them the day before the lake froze over. The docks are ready for winter again and we are looking into ways to develop a security program. Hope to see you around the Club.




Golf Outing • Change of Date


CONSTRUCTION REPORT

he construction project consists of an addition and a remodeling of existing facilities (See the floor plan). Because of the late start of construction and the early arrival of winter, the addition to the Clubhouse has not proceeded on schedule. This dition will contain a 8' x 16' walk-in cooler, an 8' x 8' walk-in freezer, and the 8' x 16' supply pantry, all at kitchen floor level.

Another very important feature that this renovation will provide is a second means of exiting in case of fire. At present, there is only one means of a fire exit and that is to the porch on the lake side. This renovation will include a fire exit on the side toward the tow path as well as a second fire exit from the second floor. The building will have exit lights and emergency lighting and will be a safer place for our functions.

The bar will be increased in length by 1/3 its present length and the majority of equipment behind the bar will be new, including a dishwasher for bar glasses, a two keg beer dispensing fountain, and a glass froster. You will have a choice for tap beer now. We are considering a brass foot rail. The Ladies' Auxiary has ordered seven additional bar stools.

The kitchen will have some new equipment. It was decided that to save



money some of the existing equipment should be reused. This new equipment and the new arrangement should speed up food preparation and improve quality of food. There will be new ceramic tile floors, new scrubbable walls, ceilings, and new lights for a more sanitary environment in the food preparation area.

This investment will cost between \$160,000 and \$175,000, but will last for many years and this upgrading was considered long-overdue. The reason it was delayed was that we had to pay off


the parking lot. This project is being financed through a short- term loan using the parking lot property as the security, not the Clubhouse. As you are aware, the cost to you, as a member of the Club, is not being increased. The total project should be completed in early March.

To facilitate the process of recognizing and getting acquainted with new members, such as Jerry, soon after the construction is finished, a wall display cabinet featuring Polaroid photographs and names of new members and their first mates will be installed. One of the concerns raised by the Membership Committee was that as a new member it takes too long

to get to know other members. Pictures will be featured for one year, or as long as display space permits. Another topic discussed by the Membership Committee was a prorated fees/dues plan that would make membership by a younger applicant (age 21-35) more economically attractive and feasible. Coincidentally, it has recently come to my attention that a former Board approved an Associate Membership alternative designed to attract younger new members. It does not appear that the Associate Member plan has ever been used or promoted. More specific information will be provided once the Membership Committee and current Board has reviewed the concept

as originally written, and either recommends modifications and/or an appropriately related recruiting strategy.

Membership, (the need for new members), is a priority for our Club. It is interesting to see that we are not alone! The December 1995 issue of Columbus Monthly magazine featured an article that suggests that other private clubs, (The University Club, Athletic Club, and Capital Club), are realizing the need for an enhanced/expanded new member recruiting strategy and effort. Copies of the article will be available at the Club. If you get the opportunity to read the article, your comments/reaction would be welcomed. I have a mail box at the Club, any comments or suggestions regarding membership, pro or con, would be appreciated.


