


The Reukels arranged to have the carpet installed at their wholesale cost, saving the Club several hundred dollars in the process. 





of Governors of one of the nation's greatest yacht clubs. I take this opportunity to thank you for your suggestions this year. I am grateful for and have implemented many of them.


The BLYC Log is our main way of communicating with the membership and I hope it was effective during my tenure as editor.














Buckeye Fleet Completes Third Leg Of Ohio River Journey

The sight coming out of the Hannibal Lock just north of New Martinsville, West Virginia, was truly inspiring: the lock's massive downriver doors swinging ponderously open, the afternoon sun streaming between them, the Highway Bridge arching stately in the near distance, connecting Ohio and West Virginia. Barb Poplis quickly sought her camera to record the moment. Moments later her husband, Paul, picked up the camera, studied it and pronounced it without film. Barb remarked, somewhat pointedly, that she thought Paul had loaded the camera; Paul said he was sure she had. You've met BLYC members Barb and Paul, of course. He's the proprietor of Paul Poplis Photography!

The Poplises were crew on Mary and Ken Keller's Knighthawk which led the BLYC Fleet out onto the Ohio River om Skippers Haven Yacht Club in Poronto, Ohio, promptly at 1000 hours on Friday, August 31, on the start of the 1998 Homer Tussing Memorial "'Tween the Trees Cruise. Next in formation were Peg and Bob Yerke aboard Buck Aye, followed by Whit and Mary Lou Tussing and friend Dave Shepherd aboard Glenford, and Randy and Kevin McClure aboard a Chris Craft bowrider hastily named Flounder in order to facilitate communication among the fleet via VHF radio. Providing a secure "back door" to the convoy were Jo-Ann and Jerry Boundy aboard Dolphin with crew Martha and Vice Commodore Tim Maite.

This year's renewal of the "Tween Trees Cruise" marked the third of five "legs" which, between the years of 1996 and 2000, will take our intrepid yachters from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (Ohio River mile marker 0) to Rising Sun, Indiana (mile marker 506). The actual distance traveled by the fleet will be almost twice this distance, since most of the legs involve round trips.

Friday afternoon, the BLYC Fleet pulled into Sistersville, West Virginia, and a well-deserved dinner and stay at the picturesque Wells Inn. Saturday, the fleet (absent *Flounder*, which remained in dock with engine problems,) was back in convoy formation en route to Marietta, Ohio, a distance of 45 river miles. 


The fleet at rest in Marietta, OH.

BUCKEYE LAKE,OHIO— Stephen Schilling is a regular at the Buckeye Lake Antique and Classic Boat Regatta.

"I've participated. every year with different boats," he said. "Sometimes you win and sometimes you don't."


This year, Schilling's boat will be a 26-foot Lyman built in 1970. 'He describes it as "high and seaworthy," with a top of teak and the transom of mahogany.

"It is a user-friendly boat, a work-horse," he said.

There are five of his type of boat on Buckeye Lake, he said.

"There are hundreds of these all over the place," he said. "They are more popular on Lake Erie."

Buckeye Lake is known for its sailing regattas, but this weekend's is for wooden motor boats. Boats will begin arriving from all over the country starting late today, according to Linda Goodman, general manager of the Yacht Club.

"There will be a lot of boats 50 and 60 years old that have been beautifully refurbished and done," she said.

Event coordinator Jay Miller said he expects a record number of boats.

"I'm not sure where to put them all," he said.

Most will be Chris-Craft and Centuries from the 1930s through 1960s.

One boat dates from 1918, and others may be older, said Miller, who will show his 1958 15-foot Lyman.

The judging of the boats will start at noon on Saturday. There will be 42 awards in 18 categories.

Along with the motor boats, there will be at least one sailboat.

Buckeye Lake resident Chris Lambrecht, 90, will be showing his 24-foot all-wood Century Raven.

He had a new deck put on the boat fairly recently.

"I have taken good care of it," said Lambrecht, a member of the Yacht Club since 1922.

Lambrecht has had two Century Ravens. The one he currently owns won a national championship. It is also the fastest sailboat on the lake, he says.

"I have to give everybody a 19-minute handicap in races," he says.
