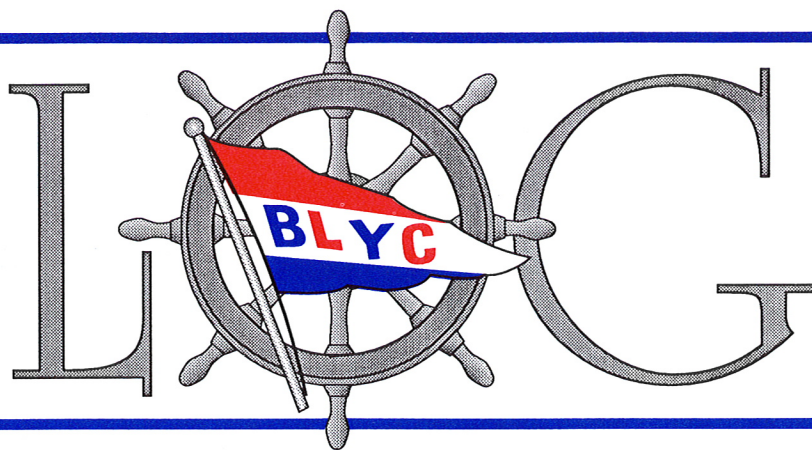

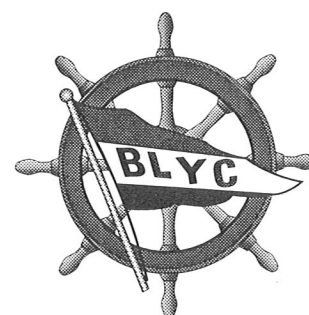

Like every one else, I am getting a little anxious for spring and the outdoor projects that will follow, but let me quickly review the status of

a few winter House and Grounds efforts in January and February.

Gun Club members and other Sunday afternoon shooters now have freshly painted ammo stands (blue/red), and a newly stained gun rack. In January we paid for the repair of a furnace that services the Fireplace Room.

The Commodore's Lounge ceiling tile project is now complete. A new ceiling fan/ light has been installed in the Commodore's Lounge over the round table to replace the old wall lamps that were falling apart. As the ceiling fan/light was being installed, the existing exhaust fan was moved so that the light/fan would be centered on the table. We now have a well-illuminated table, and an efficient smoke exhaust system (ceiling fan to exhaust fan combination).

The Board voted and received Trustee approval in February to replace the wallpaper in the coatroom entrance, hallway, and stairwell. A committee of Auxiliary and Board members selected a paper and border that would be attractive, tasteful, durable, and at the same time would blend in traditionally with the Club's current decor. The Auxiliary agreed to purchase the wallpaper. Several Auxiliary members have volunteered their expertise and labor to the wallpaper-hanging project.

A committee has been appointed by the Commodore to consider other Commodore's Lounge maintenance, improvement, and decorative needs. The Trustees suggested that the Board address further Commodore's Lounge refurbishing from a "One project" pro-

spective, versus a series of incremental improvements over a period of time that might not blend well together, and that could detract from the current level of traditional appeal. The committee, consisting of Commodore Maite, Commodore Clark, Vice Commodore DeSantis, and myself will be reviewing options with the help of a professional decorator. 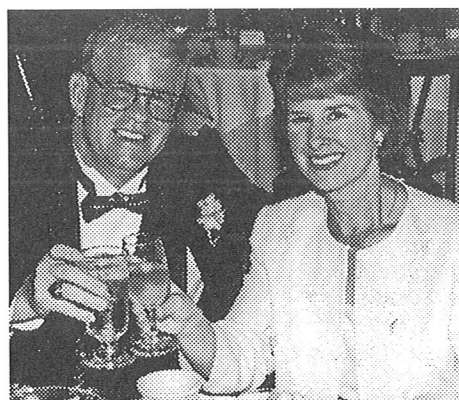

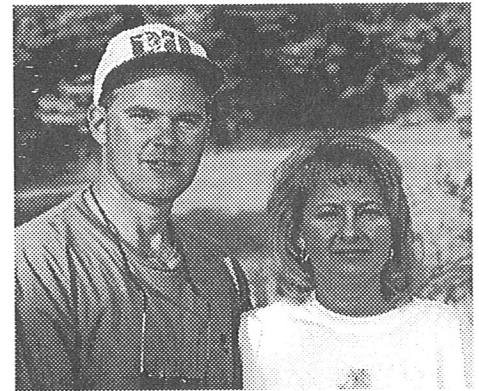

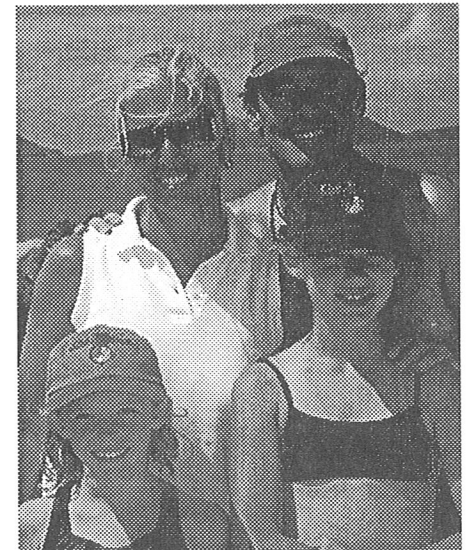

Although Old Man Winter seems to have taken quite a hold on our lake, spring will be here soon and, with it, time to get the boats

into the water. Recently, I've heard many sailors talking around the Club about plans for the upcoming season. Several members got together recently to watch the final race of the Louis Vitton Cup (the challenger series for the America's Cup) at the Club. Unfortunately, *Prada*, the Italian team, beat America One. This will be the first time since the Cup's inception in 1851 that there is no American team competing in the Cup Match! The Cup Match runs through March 9 so keep an eye out at the Club for information or visit www.americascup.org online.

I'm sure that when the ice breaks, the race to be the first boat in the water will begin. Last year, I think that Dan Knaul took the honors of the first

powerboat in at the Club launching (and taking evening cruises) in early March - BRRRRRR! I tried hard to be the first sailboat but was edged out by only a couple of days by another Sunfish. I'm getting the wetsuit out—it's almost time to sail!

This year, we'll kickoff the sailing season with our annual Sailors' Night at the Club. Dates and more information will be available in the April Log. The first Sunday race is scheduled for May 14.

Junior Sailing Camp will be held during three weeks in June—June 12-16 - *Beginners*, June 19-23 - *Intermediate/Advanced* June 26-30 *Beginners (Intermediate/Advanced that cannot make Week 2)*. Plans are still coming together for sailing camp and more details will follow in the next Log. The cost this year will be \$160 for children and grandchildren of members (\$150 if sending more than one child from the same family) and \$175 for children of non-members. This year, *the fee includes the cost of lunch for the week*. In the past, nearly all the juniors at camp have eaten lunch at the Club. Rather than collecting the money for food separately, it is being added into the cost of camp to ease

record keeping and eliminate confusion. If your juniors will be bringing their own lunches, please contact me and we can work out alternate fees. More details and registration forms will follow in the April and May Logs. Registration forms will also be available at the Club.

The Junior Racing Team is getting organized and ready for a busy 2000 season. The Board and Trustees have approved the purchase of 2 Club Junior boats for our juniors to race and for use in training. Condensed History of Buckeye Lake and BLYC

The following is condensed from the History of the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club by the perpetual BLYC Historian Kyle Armstrong.

Without his effort, much club history would have been lost.

EPISODE 1: GEOLOGY THE VERY BEGINNING

In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth. He rested on the seventh day in order to contemplate the appropriate location for the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club. From time to time thereafter, the land surfaces repetitively rose and eroded and were swept and shaped by glaciers. Surface contours came and went. Millions of years ago a river was formed and flowed generally along the course of the present day Licking River but in the opposite direction. However, some ten or twenty thousand years ago the most recent glacier bulldozed in from remote northern regions covering that ancient river with earth and rocks the glacier brought along from the north country. The old river bed still lies about 300 feet below the surface, its valley filled with the glacial debris and providing a reliable source of well water for us.

A high plateau existed in the area and checked and diverted the glacial ice flow along a ragged line passing through the region. Licking hills, now plainly visible at the east end of Buckeye Lake, are the remains of a headland in the plateau. A deep depression was formed at the foot of this headland. The waters of the melting glacier flowed into that depression to begin the formation of the lake.

Glacial water and precipitation went to work on the basin and shore line, radically and variously altering the land, carving new valleys and deepening depressions in the glacial drift. Rains, melting snows and frost gouged new

ravines in the adjoining plateau. The water carried debris into the lake raising her water. The lake overflowed, cut its way through to adjacent depressions and valleys to the northwest. The tributary valleys and ravines continued the flow, alternately filling basins and spilling out to carve new basins. The alternating erosion and silting continued in a repetitive manner still progressing today.

As the region warmed and the glacier receded to the north, the climate grew milder, the land gradually lost its bleakness and the shores and surrounding hills, plains and valleys became covered with a vast wooded wilderness, filled with deer, wild pigeons, turkeys and other creatures. The shallows and marshy fringes were blanketed with lush aquatic and semi-aquatic plant life and the deeper waters became populated with fish and amphibia.

Aboriginal tribesmen visited the lake beside a trail extending from the Ohio River to Lake Erie. They named her the Big Pond. Surrounding her were wide marshy areas which together with the Big Pond they called the Big Swamp. The area teemed with varied wildlife of waters and forests. Here the tribesmen tarried for food and refreshment, before porting their canoes from Great Bend in the South Fork of the Licking River to Walnut Creek of the Scioto. We have arrived at the mid-1700s.
