

Even though we are going to be outside more this summer, take a look at the new blinds in the Commodore's Lounge. Mark Russell did a great job installing them for Mother's Day.



### 'Tween The Trees' Cruisers To Enjoy Many Cincinnati Attractions

hen this year's 'Tween the Trees' Cruise participants tie up for the night, it will be just the beginning of a great weekend in one of Ohio's most interesting and active cities.

Arriving Friday afternoon, August 4, at Watertown Yacht Club, Newport, Kentucky, captains and crews will be transported by vans to Comfort Suites on Newport's historic Riverboat Row. Once settled in their rooms, cruise participants can travel across the river into downtown Cincinnati on round-trip shuttle busses that pass Comfort Suites every 15 minutes. Cost of the trip is just 25 cents per person.

There's something to do for every taste. Museums, entertainment, dining and shopping opportunities are either on, or just off, the bus route. And the Cincinnati Reds are in town both Friday and Saturday nights, playing night games against the Marlins. Shuttle busses run pass the stadium until 1 a.m. both nights.

While captains have had to register their boats by now to assure a slip at Watertown Yacht Club, it may be worth check-

ing with either Jerry Boundy (614-221-4402) or Ken Keller (614-846-8761) to see if a slip has become available.

Other deadlines loom. Many captains and their crews will be staying Thursday night, August 3, in Shawnee State Park Lodge, just west of Portsmouth, before the fleet sets out Friday morning from Shawnee Sate Park Marina. If you would like to stay at the Lodge, **You Must Call And Confirm Your Reservation By June 21.** The telephone number is 740-858-6621. Mention that you are part of the BLYC group.

Reservations are also required for Friday and Saturday, August 4 and 5, at Comfort Suites. Jo-Ann Boundy has reserved a block of rooms in the fleet's name. Rates vary according to room locations. To reserve a room, contact Jo-Ann at (614) 224- 2115.

Finally, tickets to either or both of the Reds' games must be arranged for individually.

This year's Ohio River cruise is the final leg of a five year, thousand mile round trip from Pittsburgh to the Indiana state line. ### Condensed History of Buckeye Lake and BLYC

The following is condensed from the History of the Buckeye Lake Yacht Club by the perpetual BLYC Historian, Kyle Armstrong. Without his effort, much club history would have been lost.

Episode III - Commercial Connection To The Outside World

Glaciers and erosion formed the Big Swamp and Big Pond, which the Indians and explorers had visited before settlement by Europeans began in the late 1700's. The settlers were self sufficient, worked hard and produced the necessities for survival. Life was rustic because it was difficult to transport in the manufactured goods of the east and difficult to transport out the products of their labor to a market for sale. They had little money, using barter in their own and surrounding communities. Thomas Minthorn carried bags of produce by horseback to Zanesville to barter for some essentials. Transportation to and from markets was limited to back-pack, horseback, strong cart or canoe over the same rough and faintly-blazed trails the Indians had used. There was an overabundance of the goods they produced because of the difficulty of transporting the goods and a shortage of goods they couldn't produce for the same reason. Worse yet, BLYC and power boats were not even invented yet and sailboats had little use on the Big Pond.

Adequate transportation facilities were needed but were beyond local economic resources. Government efforts were hindered by events leading to and resulting from the war of 1812. Governor Dewitt Clinton of New York had promoted the Erie Canal from the Hudson River to Lake Erie, and in 1823 "Clinton's Big Ditch" neared completion. Clinton had risions of tapping the rich Ohio country and, at the same time, Governor Jeremiah Morrow of Ohio was trying to improve Ohio transportation. With a joint effort including New York money, a study to find several feasible routes for barge canals in Ohio was undertaken. In 1825, the Ohio General Assembly authorized construction along two routes, one leading from Lake Erie at Cleveland, up the Cuyahoga valley, down the Tuscarawas and Muskingum valleys, up the Licking valley, down Walnut creek and Scioto valleys to the Ohio River at Portsmouth.

Early on Saturday, July 4, 1825, a great crowd gathered for a ground breaking ceremony at Licking Summit. This is

near what became Taylor's Locks, midway between what is now Newark and Hebron, beside Route 79 and is commemorated by a bronze plaque on a granite boulder erected in 1925 by Licking County. Settlers from around the Big Pond were there, many from along the route of the coming canal. Some were newcomers looking for work on the project. It was a major event with a band and a detachment from the Chillicothe Volunteers standing at attention. Thomas Minthorn from the Big Pond was there and so was Elnathan Schofield, the original surveyor of the Big Pond area, later a state senator from Lancaster; and, most importantly, then a member of the Ohio Canal Commission. The governors of Ohio and New York, who were mentioned above, were there too. The ceremonial spades of earth were turned, and axes, mattocks and shovels were put briefly to work. Trees fell, roots were grubbed, mules strained at slipscrapers and the canal began. Then the remainder of the holiday - and night - was devoted to conversation, feasting, games, dancing, refreshment, fighting and revelry in general. Perhaps this was the real founding of BLYC.

Construction contracts were let competitively to different organizations and people for clearing a site, constructing a lock or building a few miles of canal. The first contract covered the section from Taylor's Locks southward to Millersport, including the embankments to raise the Big Pond for storage of locking water. Today we call one embankment the north bank atop which sits the "towpath" and along which live many of our members. Within a year of the groundbreaking ceremony, thousands of men, mules and oxen were building the canal. To dig the canal and raise embankments, the earth was loosened by plows and then moved by slip-scrapers, dragged by mule teams or yokes of oxen, and held down laboriously by strong men at the handles. Much was dug with picks and shovels and hauled by wheel barrows.


