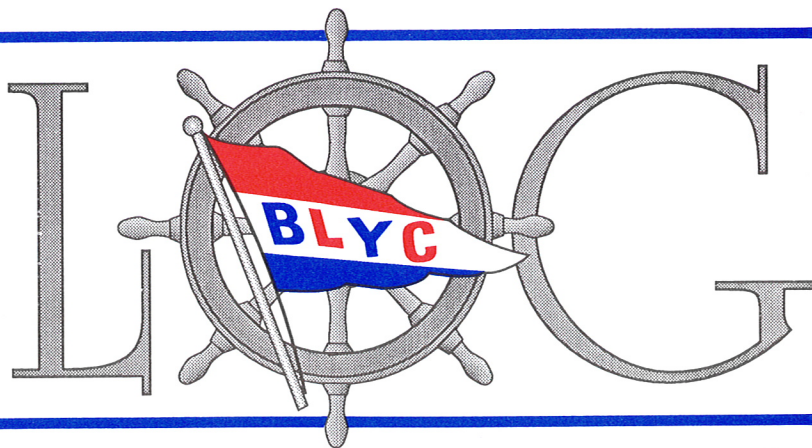

The proposed changes are published in the Log for your review, as well as on the club website. Please feel free to contact any member of the Board with your feedback, or post your comments on the website. The Board will vote on these amendments at their regular meeting in March.

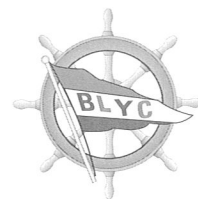

Rentals and Docks

Where to start? The past month has brought more rain. Some of it was frozen. As you may well know it caused a lot of hardship for many people. There was substantial damage to the trees around the Club and the rental house west of the entrance. This added the unexpected cost of clean up to the budget. With the loss of power here at BLYC the bubblers stopped working which caused ice to form around the docks. The warmer temperatures caused the ice to break up and begin to shift. This caused structural damage to the supports of the covered docks. Commodore Harris called an emergency meeting. In attendance were most of the Board, several of the Trustees and Frank Foster IV. The situation was evaluated and discussed. The group approved the emergency funds needed to repair the damage and Frank Foster gave the project his immediate attention to insure the integrity of the roof structure. The repairs are now complete. A grateful THANK YOU to Frank for his immediate response to the needs of the Club. Area 8 sustained considerable damage as well. These dock repairs will be addressed in the early spring; estimates to make the repairs will be gathered. While the group was together and the lake at the time was down, we were able to see the deteriorated condition of the sea wall around the docks and the island. The wall has served us well and now is in need of serious repair. As I understand the current wall has been in place for about 50 years. We got our money's worth. The repair and/or replacement of the seawall is going to be costly. There is no way around it. If we don't take action and the wall deteriorates to the point where the back fill washes out, the concrete walkways could drop. Then along with

the cost of repairing the seawall, we would also have the cost of dredging and walkway replacement. The tentative plan is to do the wall in sections, starting with the area in the worst condition, put in new and slightly wider walkways between the docks and much needed new electric around the docks.

Stay tuned to this column for various concepts to encourage support from YOU as a member and an essential part of the BLYC. Yes, the BLYC needs a little help. WE all are the BLYC. Look at all the major projects and repairs that have been accomplished over the past several years. For example, the NEW PORCH, a NEW ROOF, and the construction of the NEW DOCKS at EASTPORT. WE, the members, made these things possible, with the guidance of the Board and the wisdom and experience of the Trustees. It is up to US, each and every current member, to continue to bear the standard. In 2006 we will be 100 years old. Who knew? Race & Regatta

Winter is easing up and everyone is starting to think about getting the boats ready for Spring. Rating for our cruiser fleet has been an interesting project for me. I have now learned considerably more about how sailboats are handicapped. There are actually four or five different handicapping systems that are popular for the large cruisers. PHRF (performance handicap racing fleet) is the sys-

tem that we use as a starting point. Amazingly, PHRF actually varies from region to region for the same boat. Local regions have independent control of their PHRF ratings for their racing fleets. PHRF numbers are actually subject to adjustment based upon the actual performance of a class boat over time. The PHRF numbers are based upon assumed sail dimensions, spinnaker size, and J measurements. As a particular boat changes its sail dimensions, engine configuration, or adds a roller furling, PHRF has provisions for adjustments in the PHRF rating based upon these changes.

Another handicapping system gaining in popularity is IMS (International Measurements System). IMS is more of an effort to precisely calculate the dimensions of the boat, mast, and sails and using these calculations generate a mathematical formula to predict the performance of the boat. PHRF is still by far the more popular rating system. Other rating tools include Americap II and Sailrater.

PHRF ratings for Lake Erie, which are the base handicap starting points for a PHRF rating for your particular cruiser, can be found at www.phrf-le.org. The PHRF fleet starts out stating that base handicaps are just that, and it is obvious just from reviewing the website that there is quite a bit of controversy over all of the PHRF ratings and adjustments for particular boats.

TOT (time-on-time) scoring is derived from the PHRF rating for each particular boat. The formula used is $TOT = 765 / (550 + PHRF)$. The 765 is a numerator coefficient that is simply designed to create a useable TOT number. It is selected so that the TOT for the boats in the middle of the fleet, work out to approximately 1.0. This simply makes the mathematical calculations easier for the race committee. The 550 (B factor) in the denominator is the critical variable factor. 550 is the favored number for average wind conditions, 480 is recommended for heavy air

or racing where all of the sailing is off the wind, 650 is recommended for very light air or races where all of the racing is to windward.

After the 2005 TOT handicaps were published, Bob Snow, as the Skipper for Salad Girl, after review, requested that Salad Girl's TOT handicap be adjusted from 1.07577 to 1.09286, disadvantaging his boat by an adjustment of approximately 1.7%. This adjustment was at Bob's request, based upon his review of the 2004 racing season, and his assessment that the 2005 handicap for his boat would be too generous, and a TOT based on a PHRF of 150 was fair. I, therefore, have agreed to adjust his handicap to the numerical TOT he requested. The 2005 Notice of Race, and 2005 TOT's, are posted on the yahoo BLYC sailing group, at:

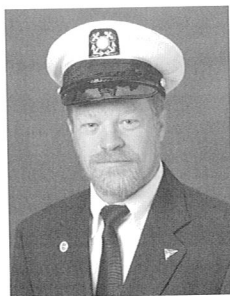

The goal of every handicapping system is to give everyone an enjoyable race with a reasonable opportunity to win the race. PHRF is a good starting point, but by its own admission, it must be adjusted for local sailing conditions and for modifications in the boat. The handicapping for the 2005 Lambrecht Cup is our best effort to comply with the spirit of PHRF and adjust handicaps to provide every boat with a fair competitive opportunity.

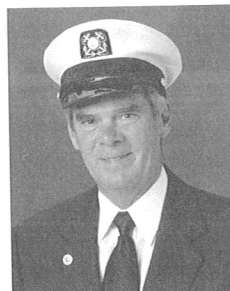

The results from the survey of former members are complete. The Board will analyze the results and take action where required. Thanks to all the former members who took the time to respond.

There have been several inquiries

concerning resident/non-resident status with membership. In order to qualify for non-resident status, a member must reside more than 75 miles from the Club AND they cannot reside inside of that radius for more than eight weeks per year. The term non-resident is not used in the same context as when referring to tax status in Florida or some other warm weather destination. Several of our members spend the winter months in Florida but return to the Buckeye Lake area for the summer. They are not considered non-resident members due to their stay of more than eight weeks in the local area. In order to be consistent with the application of our By-Laws concerning resident/non-resident issues, the office must have a permanent out-of-the-area mailing address for any member seeking non-resident status. Please feel free to contact me with any specific questions.

This might also be a good time to discuss our current policy regarding the membership opportunities for children of active members. Quoting from the By-Laws: "Children of an active member in good standing or of the spouse of such an active member may become an active member without the payment of an initiation fee if they submit their application for membership, or a letter requesting active membership before the following time limit and if they otherwise meet the requirements for membership. The application must be submitted before reaching age 21, or before reaching age 23 if the applicant is a full time college student from age 21 to age 23."

The above rule was obviously drafted by an attorney. In plain English: your sons and daughters can join the Club as active members and avoid the \$2500 initiation fee if they do so before age 21. If they are in college the age limit is extended to 23. If you are thinking of buying a membership for your children, don't miss this opportunity.

Buckeye Lake Yacht Club: Proposed changes to the Club By-Laws

The Board of Governors is currently considering three changes to Article I of the Club By-Laws - Member's Qualifications & Privileges.

As required by Article X of the Constitution, the changes are being published in the February issue of the Log. The Board would appreciate all feedback and suggestions from the membership.

Proposed By-Laws Change January 2005 - Distaff Members

Delete the current section and replace with:

Article 1. Section 8 (b) DISTAFF MEMBERS who were married to active members with membership dates prior to August 14, 1997, shall be permitted to continue as distaff members. Distaff members may become regular members without the payment of an initiation fee.

The current by-law prohibits any new distaff membership after August 14, 1997. It is the understanding of the current Board that the intent at that time was not to eliminate distaff membership entirely, but rather to limit it to those who, at the time they joined, would have had the expectation of the possibility of distaff membership for their widowed spouse in the future. Since 1997, the application of the current rule has not been consistent and this revision would help to clarify the policy on distaff membership.

Proposed By-Laws Change January 2005 - Social Members

Delete the following section:

Article 1. Section 7 (a) SOCIAL MEMBERS ...

This section is seldom used and, as written, is impractical and redundant. The Board may grant Guest privileges to "Distinguished Persons" under Article VI Section 1(c) to accomplish the same purpose as intended by "Social Membership."

As Social Member is not a class of membership as defined in the Constitution (Article IV, Section 2(a)), it is recommended that this section be deleted.

Proposed By-Laws Change January 2005 - Family Members

Add the following:

Article 1. Section 5 (b) FAMILY MEMBERS. Children of an active member in good standing or the spouse of such active member may be an active member by paying 50% of the initiation fee if they submit their application for membership, or a letter requesting active membership before the following

time limit and if they otherwise meet the requirements for membership. The application must be submitted before reaching the age of 40.

This change would allow members to encourage their sons and daughters to join the Club.

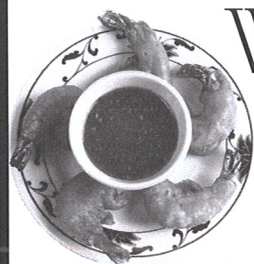
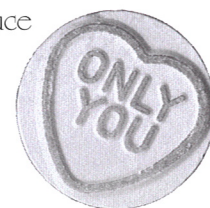

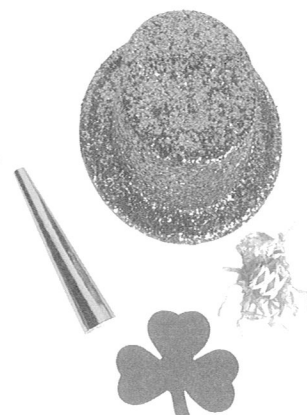
